AFFAIRS IN ILLINOIS.

ITEMS GATHERED FROM VARIOUS SOURCES.

That Our Neighbors Are Doing—Matters of General and Local Interest—Marriages and Deaths—Accidents and Crimes—Personal Pointers.

Mrs. GALLO, an Italian woman of Chicago, had trouble with a neighbor, Mrs. Vallone, another Italian.

The Illinois Humane Society at Chicago report that during the month of March it investigated 165 complaints; rescued and remedied the condition of 67 children; surrendered five children to institutions by court on petitions; placed three children in institutions, temporarily; prosecuted five persons for cruelty to children...

Two MEN, Edward Mahoney and John Monahan, laborers, of Chicago, accused of bartending of robbing them, and assistant Officer John Uhrig when he attempted to prevent an assault on the bartender. Uhirg fired four times, killing Mahoney and slightly wounding Monahan.

At Springfield, George Hudson, aged 14 years, was shot and instantly killed by his brother Charles, aged 17 years, while the two were playing together. The shooting was purely accidental.

In uninhabitable swamps, with reptiles and animals for her only companions, Madison county hunters discovered a woman who apparently has never known civilization. She lives in a hollow tree. Authorities will attempt her capture.

At the March term, 1884, of the Jackson County Circuit Court, Thomas J. Russell was convicted of murder and sentenced to the penitentiary for fifty years. Governor Pifer commuted the sentence to twelve years.

T. DANCE, a brakeman on the Mobile & Ohio Railroad, fell from his train near Springfield and was instantly killed.

FREDERICK COPPEL, an old resident of Mokena, Will county, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head.

IDA MILLER, 15 years old, died at Queens Lake, from the effects of an operation on one of her eyes.

A CHICAGO cabman, John Minick, shot and seriously wounded Thos. McLaughlin and Albert Brady, in a quarrel over a woman. He was arrested.

A man calling himself T. H. Loss, of Nashville, Tenn., had borrowed the business men of Belvidere out of considerable money. He played the old game of locating an immense imaginary factory. He is under arrest.

VANDALIAS' old soldier, John Sullivan, who disappeared, has been located at the Dayton, O., Soldiers' Home, where he is having a good time with the boys.

The announcement that a German syndicate has been investing on a tremendous scale in Illinois property is a refreshing change from the everlasting reports that English capitalists are gobbling up everything in sight. Not that the one investment is a greater benefit or more acceptable than the other to Americans, but the change from English to German is at least a change.

H. D. KELLY, Chicago, iron founder, has failed. Assets, \$20,000; liabilities, \$10,000.

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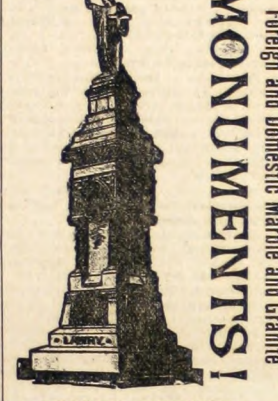
