Quarter of a Million Lost.

Numbers 1 and 4 coal breakers of the Kingston Coal Company at Edwardsville, Pa., together with several boiler and machine houses and other outbuildings, were totally destroyed by fire.

Tragedy in a Concert Hall.

The Excelsior Concert Hall, in the Bowers, New York, was the scene of a murder and suicide. Ida Brevoort, one of the singers, was shot in the temple by a man whose name is thought to be Wilbur.

Tackled the Wrong Passenger.

At Salina, Kan., nine prisoners in the county jail overpowered and strangled the sheriff, and attempted to break the jail door down.

Ankle Insurance.

There is \$1,000,000 insurance on the property of the Troy Steel and Iron Company at Troy, N. Y., which was damaged nearly \$400,000 by fire.

CURRENT HAPPENINGS.

THE OLD WORLD.

A crowd composed of about a thousand workmen met on the Piazza Savonarola in Florence, Italy, during the progress of the meeting a speaker made a most violent and incendiary address, calling upon the workmen present to plunder the houses of the wealthy classes.

Near Vienna a passenger traveling in an express train suddenly drew two revolvers, and demanded of his three fellow-travelers their money and valuables.

The Greek Christians living at the capital of the Island of Zante attacked the Hebrew quarter, and encountered the police. Several of the attacking party were killed.

FINANCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL.

A Washington (Ind.) dispatch says five hundred coal miners employed in the mines near that city are on a strike.

Pittsburg is fairly started in the eight-hour movement, with 5,000 carpenters out placing other trades in a peculiar position that 20,000 workers of other building organizations will soon follow.

In the Pittsburg mining district the expected sensation is the promised importation of 7,000 workmen from different parts of the East.

BIG WHEAT YIELD SURE BLAINE WAS AROUSED.

GREAT ADVANCEMENT IN THE CONDITION OF THE PLANT.

Improvement in Illinois 17 Per Cent. and in Other States 13 Per Cent.—Losses Only in a Few Counties From Hessian Fly and Winter Killing—Glad Tidings.

The Farmers' Review says: The recent rains have materially advanced the prospects of the crop. This improvement has averaged 7 1/2 per cent. in all the States, Kansas showing the least gain and Illinois the greatest.

Ohio shows a gain of 7 per cent. on condition, reports being received from sixty-one correspondents. Only twenty-two report any loss from freezing and winter weather, and these losses average 10 per cent.

Michigan nearly keeps pace with Ohio, showing a gain of 7 per cent. Twenty-eight counties show the prospects to report from eight counties a crop of an average average damage of 8 per cent. from insects, scarcity of snow and from frost.

Kentucky shows a gain of 10 per cent. Two counties show an average loss of 6 per cent. from winter killing and freezing in the fall.

Missouri has gained 8 per cent. in condition. From fifty-two counties came flattering reports of the prospects of an increase of 10 per cent. over the loss during the season of 8 per cent. on an average, most of this being due to the Hessian fly.

From fifty-one correspondents in Kansas, gratifying reports were received. Several counties report a loss of 10 per cent. from the fly, from the dirt blowing off and leaving the seed bare, and from other causes.

BLAINE WAS AROUSED.

HIS SHARP REPLY TO PREMIER RUDINI.

The Secretary of State Contradicts the Marquis, Who Declared that the American Diplomat Made Use of a Confidential Dispatch to Help His Cause.

Secretary Blaine replied to the dispatch of Premier Rudini to the Marquis Imperiali, which was made public in a special issue of the Roma paper, and telegraphed to this country.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4, 1891. A series of statements addressed to the Marquis Imperiali by the Secretary of State was telegraphed from Rome yesterday, and was published by the press of the United States to-day.

Italian Minister, Washington: Our requests to the Federal Government are very simple. Some Italian subjects acquitted by the American courts while under immediate protection of the authorities.
