

AMBER 768—By Almont 33, sire of Westmont, 2:13; Piedmont, 2:17, and 39 sons and 19 daughters are producers of 2:30 trotters. 1st dam Polly, by Mambrino Chief 11.—(Sire Lady Thorne, 2:18; Woodford Mambrino, 2:21, and 25 sons and 16 daughters producers.) 2d dam, by Parks' Highlander, 3d dam, by Grey Eagle. (Grand sire dam of Grafton, 2:24, and Edgewater, sire of Harry W., 2:27, and dam of Edgemark, 4 years, 2:16.) 4th dam, by Bertrand.
