There were nineteen votes cast at the election Monday. The judges and clerks spent the day telling stories. Ben Thompson was the champion.

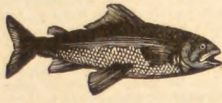
Lewis Clover and wife went to Aurora last Saturday for a few days visit.

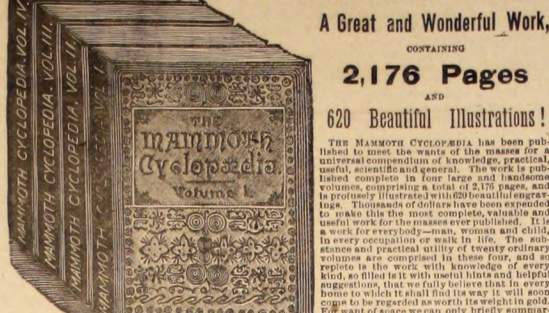
