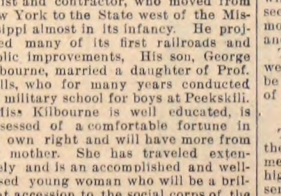

THE DICTATOR OF CHILI.

GROSS CRUELTY OF TYRANT BALMACEIDA.

Tortures rivaling those of the Inquisition Practiced on Political Opponents—Fingers of Victims Fought to Grip and Tacks Driven in Their Hands—Poor Place to Talk.

Many startling facts in connection with the revolution now raging in Chili, which throw light upon the ferocity and despotism of Balmaceda, are given to the public by three gentlemen, two of whom are Chilians, who arrived last week.

The stories show that Balmaceda is well termed "the tyrant." In Santiago, where his headquarters are, no one dares to utter a word against him. He has caused a cross of red to be painted on the houses of all people whom he suspects of being not in sympathy with him.

Within a few moments of the cloud-burst the water was fully six feet deep in the streets. When it began receding the great damage to property could be discerned.

The only fatality was in the Copperas Creek valley, just across the line in Fulton County. A family named Gray had a cabin in the valley, and when the flood fell the banks of Copperas Creek and rushed down the valley the inmates grew alarmed.
