

The County Fair.
 Since last seen in Chicago, "The County Fair" has made a circuit of the country which may fairly be said to have developed into a triumphal tour. 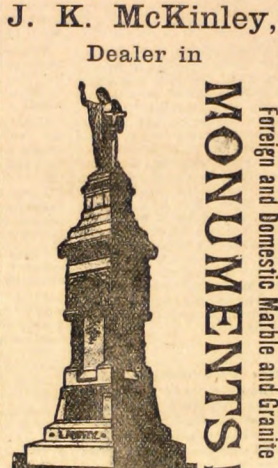
