OUR ASSESSMENT.

Assessor Kelagher has kindly furnished us with the following facts regarding his work:

The assessed value of town lots is \$104, 070; farm lands, \$219,015; there were 984 horses assessed at \$19,340; 1440 cattle at \$7,744; 24 mules and asses at \$234; 319 sheep at \$492; 1198 hogs at \$1659; 7 steam engines at \$880; 26 safes at \$475; 345 carriages and wagons at \$1539; 357 watches and clocks at \$690; 262 sewing machines at \$709; 29 piano fortes and 62 melodians and organs. The assessed amount of merchandise on hand is \$14,995; material and manufactured articles, \$1007; manuf. and tools, machinery etc., \$1792; gold and silver plate, \$50; diamonds and jewelry, \$65; credit of bank, banker etc., \$9286; other money, \$5678; credits, \$9,381 household and office furniture, \$6418; investments in real estate and improvements, \$1,663; grain, \$3,276; all other personal property, \$1,069. Total, \$86,957. One hundred and thirty dogs are taxed.

Sons of Veterans Encampment.

Henry Fox Camp Sons of Veterans will be represented at the annual encampment to be held at Decatur, July 25-31. The Grand Army with its 5,000 Posts and 500,000 members is the most patriotic order on earth, and the Sons come next. The order in this state is growing rapidly, and its workings teach patriotism, fidelity to home, state and nation. Any son of a deceased or honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine who served in the war of the rebellion, over 18 years of age, is eligible to membership. There are 350 camps in the Illinois division, with a membership of 8,000. Every camp will be represented and there will be about fifteen well-drilled companies present. It is expected that there will be about 2,500 sons present. The Decatur people are making great preparations for the entertainment of visitors. They offer \$515 in cash prizes for competitive drilling.

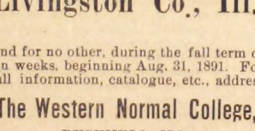
