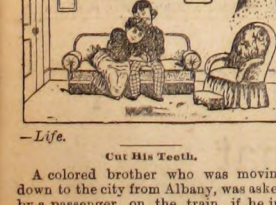


No Cause for Apprehension.

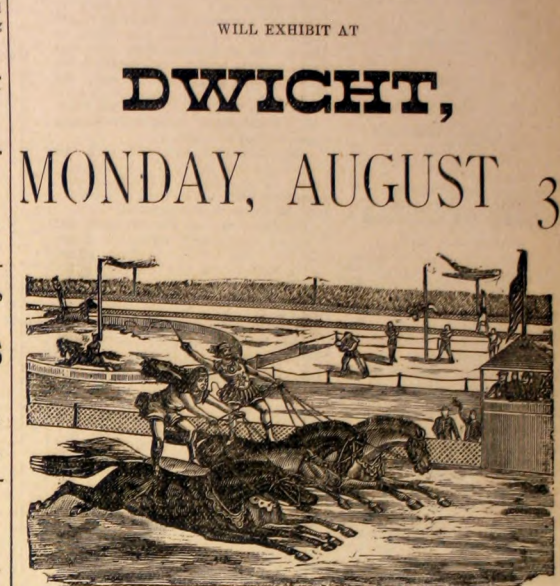
