**Amendment to Chapter Fifty (50).**

Ordinance of the Village of Dwight, Defining the Fire Limits and Regulating the Construction, Repairing and Alteration of Buildings Therein.

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the village of Dwight that section numbered one (1) of chapter numbered fifty (50), ordinance of the village of Dwight be amended to read as follows, to-wit: That the fire limits of said village shall include all that portion of said village bounded as follows: Commencing at the alley on the east side of block ten (10) in the original town of Dwight, thence running west to Prairie avenue, thence south on Prairie avenue to the alley in block twenty-three (23), thence east on said alley to the east line of the original town plat of the town of Dwight, thence north to the alley north of Mason avenue in block nine (9), thence west to Franklin street to the place of beginning.

SECTION II. This amendment shall take effect and be in force from and after its due passage and publication.
