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EDUCATIONAL COLUMN.

The attention of teachers who of necessity must take the coming examinations, and of those who are contemplating making an effort to secure a certificate for the first time, is called to the fact that they will be required to pass professional examination in addition to the academic examination heretofore given.

EXAMINATIONS. These will occur on the third Friday and Saturday of each month, extending through the two days mentioned. If candidates are late, that is their misfortune.

RENEWAL OF CERTIFICATES. It is no pleasure to us to require a teacher to take the examination and spend from one to two hours looking over a set of papers when we are convinced by the proven success of the candidate in the school room that he or she is a competent teacher.

DISTRICT EXAMINATION ON THE JANUARY WORK. This examination will occur Feb. 23 and 24, and will cover the work for the fourth month of the school year. This will be the fourth month the school has been in session, whether the work was done in December or January.

PUPILS' TOWNSHIP EXAMINATION. I desire teachers to forward me the names of those who will probably take the township examination, which will occur some time early in May. The requirement for admission to this examination is that a pupil shall have made a grade of 80 per cent or more in the examinations of the year.

COURSE OF STUDY. It has been thought best that a county course of study, based upon the uniform series of books should be prepared for our use, and the board of supervisors, after considering the matter, authorized the incurrence of the expense of publishing enough copies of such course, as should be necessary to supply each board of directors, and each teacher with one.

It is hoped that all will read carefully the papers read at the institute, which are now being published and sent to each teacher, also the educational columns each week, as much that is important will be found there. The papers of this county generously donate a column for the benefit of the schools, thus enabling all to become thoroughly posted on proposed measures.
