

MARY FULLER'S ROMANCE.
The Chief Justice's Oldest Daughter Disappoints Her Parents.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Another daughter of Melville W. Fuller, chief justice of the supreme court, has just consummated a romantic marriage. It is now the oldest daughter, Mary. Contrary to her parents' will she has married Mr. Collin C. Manning, son of ex-Governor Manning, of South Carolina. Young Manning, while in Washington as private secretary to Senator M. C. Butler, was presented to Miss Fuller, and a mutual attachment ensued. Despite parental opposition Manning continued his attentions to Miss Fuller, who, with the intent finally to settle the matter, was sent to Berlin to finish her musical education.

Were Married in Italy.
Miss Fuller, however, constantly corresponded with Manning. For some cause Mrs. Fuller decided to bring her daughter home, but soon after her departure for Berlin it was learned that Mr. Manning had also started for abroad. While Mrs. Fuller and Miss Fuller were traveling in Italy they were met by young Manning, who soon persuaded the young lady to marry him. When apprised of the state of affairs Mrs. Fuller appeared surprised and chagrined, but seeing that opposition was of no avail she reluctantly yielded, bestowing her blessing, and soon after attending the wedding.

DENONCED THE PRESS "MENTOR."
Grand Army Men Condemn Dana's Attack on Alger.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 18.—The state encampment of the G. A. R. yesterday adopted a resolution indorsing the record of General R. A. Alger and scolding the New York Sun for the articles recently published reflecting upon his military career. The resolutions are as follows: "Resolved, That the article published in the New York Sun reflecting on the military career of our past commander-in-chief, Russell A. Alger, is a libel upon the fair fame and well earned reputation of a distinguished soldier and patriot, a disgrace to American journalism, and an insult to the Grand Army of the Republic which should be condemned by every citizen of the United States."

The Industrial Conference.
ST. LOUIS, Feb. 18.—Up to yesterday ten reform and industrial organizations had notified the executive committee of the conference to be held in St. Louis next week of their intention of being officially represented. Nearly all the railroads have given a rate of one fare for the round trip, and a very much larger attendance is expected than was at first anticipated. The total number of applications for hotel and boarding-house accommodations exceeds 15,000, and telegrams from California and other distant states have been received announcing the starting of large delegations for St. Louis.

Four Tickets in Louisiana.
NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—Four state tickets are now in the field—two Democratic and two Republican. The Warmoth faction of the Republican party yesterday held its state convention and nominated a state ticket as follows: Governor, John E. Breun; lieutenant governor, James C. Weeks; attorney general, James M. Edwards; auditor, Stephen R. Gay; treasurer, James A. Lewis; secretary of state, John E. Stass; superintendent of education, Edward J. Barrett. There are two colored men on the ticket, Lewis and Stass.

Condemned the Early Convention.
SENECAVILLE, N. Y., Feb. 18.—The Second assembly district Democratic convention met here yesterday. F. E. Shearman, of Jamestown, and Arthur Moore, of Fredonia, were chosen delegates to the state convention. The convention passed strong resolutions protesting against the early convention, which will be sent all over the country.

Milwaukee Republicans.
MILWAUKEE, Feb. 18.—The Republican party of Milwaukee in convention yesterday afternoon nominated the following ticket: Mayor, Paul Bechtner; controller, John T. Kelly; city attorney, W. A. Austin; treasurer, Fred Heinen; Frank E. Woller, the present incumbent, was named for clerk of the municipal court by the county convention.

Has Custody of Palmer's Boom.
CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Delos P. Phelps, who is credited with the custody of Gen. John M. Palmer's presidential boom, is in the city, and says that Palmer can carry Illinois. He has been in Texas recently, and says that Palmer is well spoken of there. He also thinks Palmer "holds over" Morrison in the matter of Illinois Democratic support.

Will Consider a Compromise.
NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—The Eastern Farmers' Alliance combine state central committee yesterday agreed to submit through a conference committee a proposition to the McEnery side for a compromise and a fusion state ticket.

A Modern Lucretia in Colorado.
GREELEY, Colo., Feb. 18.—The shooting of Mrs. George Younginger, which occurred here Monday, has been apparently explained. It was developed at the inquest that when the Youngingers were moving to Greeley some time ago they traveled part way with David Patterson, Mrs. Younginger and her child, and with Patterson to lighten Younginger's burden. When away from the latter Patterson is said to have assaulted Mrs. Younginger and accomplished his purpose. This preyed upon her mind until she confessed to her husband, and shortly afterward shot herself. Patterson has been arrested.

Promised to Pray for Chicago.
ROME, Feb. 18.—Pope Leo gave an audience to a number of the Chicago World's fair committee, who kissed the hand of his holiness, and by the request of the pope gave a brief explanation of the circumstances and objects of the exposition. The pontiff said that he would take steps to stimulate Roman Catholic interest in the fair and would especially commend the subject to the holy congregation for the propagation of the faith. The pope also promised to pray for Chicago.

Does Look a Little that Way.
NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Many Russian Jews are applying daily at the office of the Russian consul general in this city to be sent back to Russia. They are unable to make a living in the United States and want to get back to their homes and friends. The Russian vice-consul, C. G. Petersen, said yesterday that the talk about these people being expelled from Russia was all nonsense.

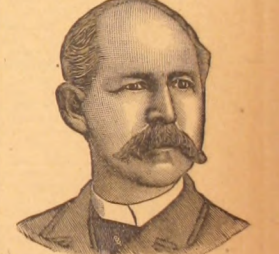
