The New Train.

The C. & A. will place in service on March 20, a new fast train, which will be known as the St. Louis Limited. It will leave Chicago daily at about 12 noon, pass Dwight about 2:15 p. m., and will arrive in St. Louis at 8:30 the same evening, thus deducting the time between Chicago and St. Louis to eight hours and a half.

Notice.

Owing to the large number of people now receiving mail at the Dwight post office it is necessary that some rules be observed in order to properly regulate the delivery of mail and to facilitate the business of the office.

Hereafter the general delivery window will be used by those having no boxes, also for the sale of stamps, stamped envelopes, cards, etc., also by box holders if they choose when this delivery is not crowded; but all persons at all times must observe their proper turn at the window and will please pass inside the rail from the right and pass out to the left.

No mail will be handed out or business transacted with anyone while outside the rail.

Box holders can pass to the left side of the office to the box delivery and thus avoid any crowd that may be at the general delivery.

All persons wishing to obtain money orders or postal notes or having the same which they wish cashed, or who may have registered or advertised letters, or who have any other business with the office which would require time to perform are requested to pass to the right to the money order window.

These regulations will impose no hardships upon anyone, and if observed will be for the interest of all concerned. J. B. PARSONS, P. M.

POINTERS TO CANDIDATES.

Requirements to be Observed Under the Australian Ballot Law.

As it has been definitely decided to hold the coming town elections under the Australian ballot law, the following pointers will be of interest to prospective candidates. About twenty names will be required to make a nomination paper valid in this township.

1.—Any man eligible can run for office who can secure a caucus nomination, or will get up a "nomination paper" and file it with the town clerk; or he can run without either if he can persuade his friends to take the trouble to write his name in the proper place on the ballot when in the voting booth.

2.—No certificate of nomination will be valid except those of regularly called caucuses of political parties, which cast at least two per cent of the entire vote cast in the town at the last general election.

3.—All nomination papers must be signed by a number of qualified voters equal to at least five per cent of the total vote cast at the last general election. 4.—A nomination paper may be filed in behalf of one or two candidates only; a full ticket is not necessary.

5.—Certificates of nominations and nomination papers must be filed with the town clerk at least fifteen days before the election.

6.—Do not include in nomination papers names of candidates who have received caucus nominations.
