**Sentenced for Life.**  
William L. Barnett, the brutal wife murderer who was to have a hearing at Morris this week, withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty, Tuesday afternoon, and was sentenced to imprisonment for life by Judge Blanchard. It was generally expected that had the trial proceeded it would have resulted in the death sentence.  
The crime was committed on the 5th of last October in Vienna township, this county, at the home of Mrs. Barnett's mother. Barnett called his wife up stairs, shot her dead, fired four bullets into his own head and one into his body and then tried to drown himself in a pond near by. It was too shallow and he returned to the house, set fire to it and laid down near his wife's body. The fire was extinguished by neighbors, and through sheer brute nature lived to receive the above sentence.

The Kankakee river is the highest this season that it has been for years. At Wilmington the river was out of its banks, and the C. & A. bridge at that place was in danger of being swept away. It is being watched day and night, and is weighed down with railroad irons, etc., to keep it in place. At the time of going to press the river had gone down some, and the danger over.

Four bodies, the sad result of the collapsed building in Chicago last week, were brought to Braidwood Wednesday for burial. The bodies were those of Mrs. Gowan and her little boy, Miss Mary Walsh and Samuel Bardsdale. Mr. Gowan, the husband of the dead woman, was taken from the ruins of the building badly crushed, and may lose his left leg. He was at one time a conductor on the C. & A., and live at Bloomington.
