DROWNED IN MAZON CREEK

Fred Drollinger, While in Swimming, is Seized With Cramps and Meets Death.

Tuesday afternoon about 6 or 6:30 o'clock a party of boys left Gardner on a hand car for the Seneca bridge over Mazon creek, to go swimming. Some two hours later a telephone message was received here from Coster, saying that Fred Drollinger had been drowned. The report was scarcely credited at first, but a searching party was organized at once and started out upon hand cars for the bridge to find out if the report was true, and if so to assist in recovering the body. The party searched along the banks of the stream without success, and returned about 10:30 o'clock. The search was kept by other parties all night, however, but up to 6 o'clock this morning the body had not been recovered.

Drollinger's companions say that he made no sign while drowning, and that they did not know of his danger until too late. The supposition is that he was seized with cramps and drowned before he could warn his companions or make any out cry. The current was swift and the water quite cool, and the condition of Fred's clothing when examined afterwards showed that he must have been quite warm when he entered the water. The search is still being carried on and the body will doubtless be found to-day.

Later.—The body was found at 8 o'clock this morning and taken to his home.

Republican County Convention.

The republican voters of Livingston county are hereby notified that there will be a republican county convention held at the court house in Pontiac, on Thursday, June 30th, 1892, at the hour of 1:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following county offices, to-wit: 1st, States Attorney; 2d, Circuit Clerk; 3rd, Coroner, 4th, Surveyor; and also to select thirteen delegates to the Senatorial and Representative Convention, and to transact such other business as may come before the convention.

Republicans residing in the various townships in said county are requested to meet at the place where the last town meeting was held in their respective towns, on Saturday, June 25, 1892 at 2 o'clock p. m. and select delegates from said town to said convention. The various town caucuses shall remain open for at least one hour and as much longer as a majority of the voters present may designate. In case the local committee of any town shall desire to change the time or place of holding said caucuses, they can do so by giving ten days notice of such change by posting notices in three of the most public places in said town and notifying the secretary of the county central committee of such change.

The basis of representation has been fixed at one delegate for 25 votes cast for Harrison & Morton in 1888, and one additional for each fraction of thirteen. The various towns will be entitled to following number of delegates.

County Superintendent's Notice.

Examinations for second grade certificates will be held in my office on the third Friday and Saturday of each month except July. The candidate must pass a thorough examination in the structure and use of words, reading, penmanship, arithmetic, grammar, geography, history, physiology, Page's Theory and Practice and school law in so far as it refers to teachers, pupils and directors, and must also show a satisfactory knowledge of the course of study for this county. For a first grade certificate, the candidate must be qualified in all that is required for the second grade and in addition must pass an elementary examination in the philosophy, zoology and botany. Estimated in per cent the required average for the second grade will be 80 with a minimum of 70; for the first grade 90 with a minimum of 70. Satisfactory evidence of a knowledge of methods of work will be required before a second grade certificate is issued, and conclusive evidence of the work on success in the work outlined for this county must be given, before a second certificate of any grade will be granted. A fee of one dollar will be charged for each examination.

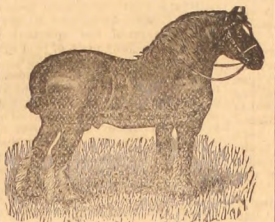
