Col. Visscher For Congress.

We clip the following from the Tacoma, Wash., News, a democratic paper, which will be of great interest to the people of Dwight and members of the great B. C. of G. club everywhere.

Few men in this state deserve more from the republican party and few men are capable of doing so much for that party, as Col. Will Visscher. If he were to go to congress from this state, there would not be a man, woman or child within the country who would not know inside or outside of his name. 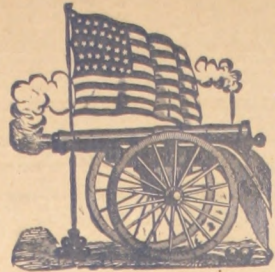

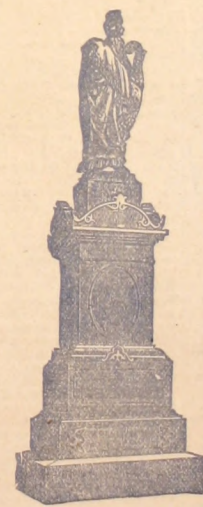
