S. A. Brito, Sheriff of Cameron county, Texas, was assassinated Sunday morning while returning from a fandango just outside Brownsville. Brito was in a carriage with his wife home, accompanied by two of his deputies.

Charles Vincent and Thomas Welch, convicts at Sing Sing (N. Y.) Penitentiary, attempted to escape, and as a result a desperate fight ensued between them and a number of the keepers, during which Vincent was shot and killed and Welch was seriously wounded.

Grand Master Sargent of the Firemen's Brotherhood has arrived in Buffalo to confer with Sweeney, the switchmen's organization. He says that the firemen will not strike unless all the other railroad labor organizations go out at the same time.

Kansas City is rapidly filling up with Knights of Pythias. The town of Sontra, Germany, was destroyed by fire. One hundred and forty buildings were burned.

The British steamer Rome has been wrecked near Algoa Bay, and all on board are thought to have perished. A Pittsburg paper prints an anonymous communication which charges that the Jordan murders were committed by tramps.

Rev. John V. Talmage, brother of the famous divine, died at Bound Brook, N. J., Saturday. At Holliston, Mass., W. S. Daboll, a well-known actor formerly of Frank Wilson's company, committed suicide by taking poison. Daboll will be remembered for his impersonation of the thief in "Ermine."

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Twelve have been killed at Coal Creek. Gen. Anderson caught—The strikers captured—Five miles out and the miners taken to an unknown place and lynched.

It is stated that Captain Keller Anderson, in command of the Coal Creek troops, has been ordered to the north by the stockade of the Knoxville Iron Company is located. It will be impossible for the miners to reach the stockade as long as the fort holds out.

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FINANCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL

Gov. Buchanan, of Tennessee, has ordered the National Guard of that State and the massing of nearly 5,000 Deputy Sheriffs at Coal Creek to aid in restoring order among the miners engaged in stamping out the convict lease system of labor.

According to the bulletins of the Iron and Steel Association, issued from New York, the recent strikes and lockouts in the iron and steel industry have reduced the production of pig iron and Bessemer steel in one year as during the twelve months which ended on the 30th of June last.

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Company and the Northern Steamship Company, the lake end of the Great Northern Railroad, are consolidating Friday at Buffalo, which will result in a complete readjustment of Lake Superior traffic and tend to steady rates.

At a meeting of Buffalo locomotive firemen, held Friday night, the sentiment was unanimous that they should join the striking switchmen out of sympathy, and the trainmen, conductors, and telegraphers may follow.

Officers have been compelled to guard the Yaston coal mines at Fairmount, W. Va., on account of the replacing of union men with non-union laborers.

R. G. Dun & Company's weekly review of trade says: Late advices from the West promise rather better crops of wheat and corn, and cotton prospects are a little better, though neither yield will approach that of last year.
