**School.**  
The new room will be opened in the Old Presbyterian Church. Miss Baker will have charge of that department, and Miss Barr will teach in the East Primary room. Doubtless the opening of this new department will cause some little confusion as the different grades are adjusted. All the A grade pupils in both intermediate departments will go to the East Side building, and Miss Conrad will care for them. The A grade pupils in the Primary Department will be promoted to the charge of Miss Hade on the West and Miss Barr on the East. Miss Barr will also have what is now Miss Conrad's B grade.  
By making this adjustment and changing the line of division of the three Primary Departments to Prairie Ave, it will give the five teachers in the lower grades from 40 to 45 pupils each. This most satisfactory division that can be made at present, all things being considered, and with the aid of all patrons, the various teachers will be able to do far more satisfactory work than it would have been possible for them to do without the new teacher, Miss Barr.  
The teachers consider it a great encouragement to have parents visit them in the school and see how their children are progressing. Several have already paid the school pleasant visits and it is hoped that others will soon follow the example.  
Pupils who have not yet entered school should do so at once, either they will have to drop back into the same grade they were in last year. All the classes in all the departments begin where they left off last spring, so unless the pupil is there, his classmates will be beyond his reach very soon.
