STORM FOLLOWS STORM.

EARLY OCTOBER WILL BRING ROUGH WEATHER.

Weather and Forecast. My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from the 25th to 29th, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 30th, cross the Western mountains about the close of Oct. 1, the great central valley from October 2, and the Eastern States about the 5th.

This disturbance will develop its greatest force on the 5th and 6th in the Eastern States and on the Atlantic coast, and will affect the weather of all the Atlantic States.

Weather ranges move from west to east across the continent, and each local forecast is made for within 250 miles east and west of the magnetic meridian mentioned, and for all the country between 25 and 50 degrees of north latitude.

CROPS HAVE BEEN INJURED. Rain, Drought and Frost in Different Sections Injure Crop Prospects.

The following is the weekly telegraphic bulletin of the Weather Bureau: Temperature-The week has been cooler than usual on Central and Southern California coasts, and generally in all districts east of the Rocky Mountains.

Over the plateau district and on the northern Pacific coast, it was warmer than usual on the Atlantic coast north of California, and the week was exceptionally warm, the excess in temperature amounting to from 5 to 7 degrees per day.

Frost occurred in the Upper Mississippi, Missouri, and Ohio valleys, New England, and in the northern portion of the middle Atlantic States, but the reports indicate no serious injury. Freezing temperature prevailed in Wyoming and Northern Montana the 14th.

Severe drought continues throughout Maryland and rain is much needed in portions of Virginia, South Carolina, Kentucky, Arkansas, Michigan and Kansas.
