 The present lull in the political world may be attributed to anticipating the results of the incoming administration. The Republicans were signally defeated at the last election, and mainly on the tariff issues, and they gracefully accept the result by bowing to the behest of the people. It is of good augury for the stability of republican institutions, when a powerful party can submit to defeat without exciting popular tumult. The next four years will prove which of the theories of the two great parties are the most conducive to the general well being of society. The solution of the tariff problem is of momentous importance, and where such vast interests are concerned should be dealt with comprehensively and in a spirit of impartiality and demonstratively shown whether protective or untrammelled freedom of trade is the most salutary and beneficial in its efforts, in regard to the general interests concerned. The advocates on both sides have advanced powerful arguments in support of their respective opinions. There are other social problems to be investigated equally as important as the tariff, and even of greater importance, such as the labor problem and its relation to capital, which will tax the brains of the solons delegated to make our laws, and this subject is so important, that its solution so difficult, that it almost baffles the attempt and must be left for discussion to a future article.

All government is designed to combine the efforts of individuals and to regulate their conduct when united. To arrive at the best means of accomplishing this end, systematic knowledge of the nature of man seems highly important, but also the knowledge of the natural laws which govern man is comparatively unknown to legislators, and so long as this exists, all attempts made for the amelioration of man will be abortive. The wise Ruler of the universe acts not by partial but by general laws, and the more the civil law approaches the Divine, the greater will be its efficacy.

Hitherto, arbitrary regulations of all sorts have been imposed upon man, and blind and unconditional obedience to those required. The martyrdom of man caused by his oppressors must cease, or else he will in the future exact terrible reprisals. The elaboration of this subject must be left to a future article.
