PLANNING IS AN PANIC. FINANCIAL STORM CONVULSES MICHIGAN'S CAPITAL.

—Plymouth, Another Michigan Town, Suffers Heavy Fire Loss—Revolutionists in Spanish Honduras Use Every Trick Before Them—Rainmakers Formed.

Told in a Few Words.

—Michigan's capital city is in a furious financial excitement, caused by the filing of mortgages aggregating \$300,000 to the Lansing Iron and Engine and Lansing Lumber Companies, in favor of O. M. Barnes, O. E. Barnes president of the Michigan National Bank.

—At Plymouth, Mich., fire started about midnight, Monday, in George Vandecar's barber shop, and before it was put under control the leading business block of the town was in ruins.

—The revolutionists in Spanish Honduras have captured the Bay Islands. Three hundred men left Ceiba under the command of a nephew of General Policarpo Bonilla for Utila.

—The rain-making companies in Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska have formed a combination and are now concentrating their attack upon the western counties within the dry belt.

—Phillip Opp, 76 years old, died of pneumonia on Saturday afternoon at Brooklyn, N. Y. His wife, Marzaretta, died just twenty-four hours later.

—Charles W. Heltzberg, manager of the St. Louis Dressed Beef and Provision Company, committed suicide by hanging himself in the slaughter house at the company's place of business.

—A special from Rutland, Vt., says Frank C. Almy, the murderer of Christie Ward, confessed to his lawyer that he is George H. Abbott, the desperado.

CRIME AND CASUALTY.

—Warren Blackwell, a wealthy farmer living near Butler, Ind., was shot and instantly killed by the Rev. C. M. Marshall of that town.

—The town of Robinsonville, Miss., was completely destroyed by a cyclone. Not a house is left in the town.

—Two Dubuque policemen, named Frith and Henry Talcott, officers in the employ of the Milwaukee Railroad Company, were shot dead Monday morning by tramps.

—A special from Eufaula, Ala., says that near the line of Quitman and Clay Counties in Georgia, was found lying in a pool of blood in his store.

—H. H. Hibbert and wife, of Chicago, residing at Fifty-third and Louisville, Ky., were shot dead in bed.

—For some time past a sneak thief has been doing the fashionable part of Lima, O., stealing small amounts of money, jewelry, etc.

—Saturday morning E. O. Heale, owner of a large stove factory near Pine Bluff, started for his mill with \$2,000.

—At Goshen, Ind., Mrs. Julia Cassel was given two years' term for robbing the Citizens' Savings and Loan Society.

—The business portion of Mulvane, Sedgewick county, Kan., was completely destroyed by fire with the exception of three or four buildings.

—The pump and brass goods department of the L. M. Runsey & Co.'s factory, St. Louis, was destroyed by fire.

FOREIGN.

—The court of arbitration sitting at Paris on the Behring Sea case has decided not to admit for the present the British supplementary report.

—Samuel Williams & Co., cotton brokers of Liverpool, have suspended with liabilities amounting to \$30,000.

—A bloodless coup d'etat was effected at Belgrade, Thursday, by King Alexander, who has heretofore governed the country through regents.

—A grand banquet was given at the palace Thursday night to celebrate King Alexander's coronation.

—The British steamship Geston, Capt. Homan, which arrived at Philadelphia from Sagua, Cuba, reports that on April 9, in latitude 33 min. 30 sec., longitude 74 min. 41 sec.

—The city authorities at Fairbault, Minn., took a novel part in a wedding, furnishing the bride and groom immediately after the ceremony.

—James Fitzgerald, owner of the Benzal Tiger Opal Mine, of Squaw Creek, Idaho, has found the largest opal ever seen there.

—The Wisconsin Assembly has voted down the bill to repeal the local option law.

—The Straits of Mackinac are clear of ice. Edward, Clearwater, and Honesta, of the United States, are clear of ice.

—The cyclone which destroyed Robinsonville, Miss., caused the death of seventeen persons and the fatal injury of thirty others.

The Provisional Government in Honolulu advises by steamer to San Francisco that Commissioner Blount's arrival was a wet blanket for the provisional government.

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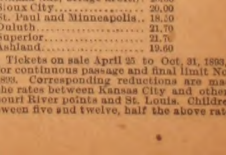
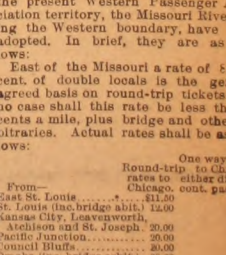
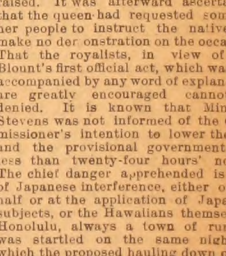
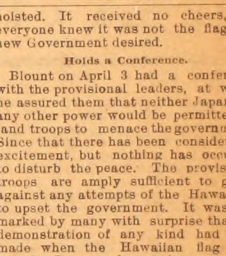
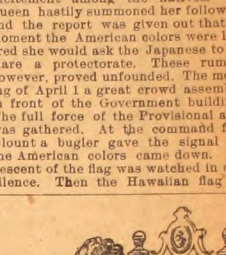
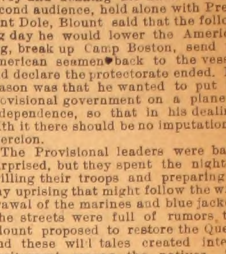
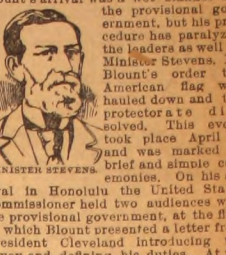
