WORLD'S COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION, CHICAGO, March 30, 1893.—To The Public: Because of many misrepresentations and statements relative to Exhibition management and affairs being in circulation through the press and otherwise, both in this country and abroad, and in reply to many letters of inquiry or complaint touching these matters, it seems advisable that some official statement regarding them should be made to the public. Therefore I respectfully ask that the widest publicity be given to the following facts:

1. The Exposition will be open in readiness for visitors May 1. 2. An abundance of drinking water, the best supplied to any great city in the world, will be provided free to all. The report that a charge would be made for drinking water probably arose from the fact that hygeia water can also be had by those who may desire it at one cent a glass.

3. Ample provision for seating will be made without charge. 4. About 1,500 toilet rooms and closets will be located at convenient points in the buildings and about the grounds, and they will be absolutely free to the public. This is as large a number in proportion to the estimated attendance as has ever been provided in any exposition. In addition to these there will also be nearly an equal number of lavatories and toilet rooms of a costly and handsome character as exhibits, for the use of which a charge of five cents will be made.

5. The admission fee of 50 cents will entitle the visitor to see and enter all the Exposition buildings, inspect the exhibits, and, in short, to see everything within the Exposition grounds, except the Esquimaux Village and the reproduction of the Colorado cliff dwellings. For these as well as for the special attraction on Midway Plaisance a small fee will be charged. 6. Imposition or extortion of any description will not be tolerated. 7. Free medical and emergency hospital service is provided on the grounds by the Exposition management. 8. The Bureau of Public Comfort will provide commodious free waiting-rooms, including spacious ladies' parlor and toilet rooms in various parts of the grounds.

Richards threw Kellogg one of his oars and attempted to get into Kellogg's boat but as his boat had drifted a few feet he was unable to do so. He then attempted to reach shore with one oar but the swift current, consequent on high water, soon carried him over the dam. The boat broke up below the dam. Kellogg had a narrow escape from the same fate, landing but a short distance above the dam. Up to last Monday the body had not been recovered.

The Fair. As most everybody knows the World's Fair, the greatest ever known, opens at Jackson Park in Chicago, next Monday, May 1. That day has been declared a holiday by Gov. Altgeld. President Cleveland and cabinet will arrive in Chicago to-day, as also will the only descendant of Christopher Columbus. Monday the exercises will commence at the park at 10 a. m., and it is the intention at present to finish them so that President Cleveland can touch the electric button at exactly 12 o'clock, high noon, which will start the ponderous machinery in motion and open a world's exposition which compared with others is like a threshing machine beside a mouse trap. It is safe to say that the crowd there next Monday will be very large, and that it will be impossible to see much of anything or take any comfort. We would advise those, especially women and children, who wish to see the fair, not to go until after the opening day, and it might be better to postpone their visit for a few weeks, when every thing is sure to be in running order.

THE STAR AND HERALD will try and keep its readers posted as to when the best time will be to visit the fair. The opening of the Illinois building will take place May 18th. The fare from Dwight for the round trip to Chicago has been reduced to \$3.00, with a prospect of several cheap excursions.
