OPENED TO THE PEOPLE

FAIR DEDICATION WILL BE IN THE OPEN AIR.

President Palmer, Director General Davis and Secretary Dickinson Rearrange the Plans of the Directory—President Cleveland Will Start the Machinery.

All Can See the Show. Chicago Convention: President Palmer, Director General Davis, and Secretary Dickinson, by a few strokes of the pen, have upset the plans of the Exposition Ceremonies Committee. Opening-day exercises will be held in the open air, and not in a small hall with closed doors for the edification of a few select guests. While the local board was by no means unanimous on the question, a few of the leading spirits got together in a back room and formulated a programme that would have insured the officials and their friends the pleasure of listening to the

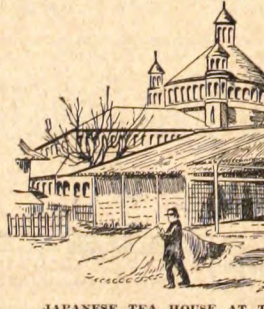
speeches and music in music hall, while several hundred thousand people would be kept waiting on the outside for the programme to conclude and for President Cleveland to set in motion the machinery of the Exposition.

The plan of building a platform on

the plaza in front of the Government building, where 50,000 people could see the exercises even if they could not hear the speeches, was opposed by Director of Works Burnham, who said the

lawn would be spoiled, and the crowd should be kept outside until after the machinery was started, anyway. His recommendations were finally adopted by the executive committee of the local board, much to the disgust of the members of the board of control. That body referred the matter to a special committee of President Palmer, the Director General, and Secretary Dickinson, and this reference was taken as an equivalent to a change of programme. When this special committee assembled the other afternoon the members got to business without much discussion. Before Col. Davis or Secretary Dickinson made any reference to the subject which they had met to discuss President Palmer stopped whistling long enough to remark: "Well, gentlemen, I guess we are pretty unanimous about this question; are we not? This show is for the people, and the people must have some return for their money."

Col. Davis and Mr. Dickinson assented, and President Palmer, after calling for his stenographer, glanced down his nose and through his glasses at a copy of a paper, and whistled some more. Ten minutes later a report was drawn up and signed by the committee, in which they regret the necessity of going counter to the decision of the directory, and recommending that the exercises be held out of doors, at the east front of the Administration Building, a small platform to be erected for the accommodation of resident Cleveland and his escort. The people who pay at the gates will see the show.

Special fete days will be a prominent and interesting feature of the World's Fair. The different States, foreign countries and many civic organizations will each have a day upon which to conduct special exercises or celebrations, and programmes for them are now being arranged. Mexican Coffee.

"You have no idea of the fineness of Mexican coffee," said Senor Gonzalez of the Continental. "Those who don't know may talk about Java and Rio and mixtures of these with any other coffees, but they all fall into disrepute when the genuine Mexican berry has been tasted. Very little coffee has been marketed from Southern Mexico, because it is nearly all consumed at home, and sells at 33 cents per pound just from the tree. "There are some varieties of coffee there that retail at \$1 per pound. This is all used by wealthy Mexican families, and the use of coffee is universal in that country. Thousands of acres of the finest coffee lands can now be purchased at prices ranging from \$2 to \$5 per acre. The title is secured from the Mexican Federal Government on easy terms. Trees bear a half crop at 3 and a full crop at 4 years of age. Three pounds to the tree is an average yield, although many trees bear from five to six pounds. An acre of land will support about 800 trees, and their average life is about 16 years. Syndicates will own all these fine coffee lands in two years, and they cannot then be purchased at any price."—St. Louis Republic.

The Important Comma.

Song and sermon alike suffer from idiosyncrasies. Take that poetic form, for example, where the sense depends almost wholly on the punctuation, as in the case of a popular song, which is usually rendered in this way, with a pause at the last word of the line: "Oh let me sit beside you in your eyes." The succeeding line of this remarkable request makes everything clear—"leading the promise of our paradise." It shows how necessary an evil punctuation is, if sense should be made. A poem divine who never used more than a couplet of verse in his sermons, amused his hearers by thus quoting from an old poem:

A Peculiar Insurance Claim.

While going through the customary formula regarding the death of the annual and wondering that a wind storm did no damage but kill one horse, the company inquired in what manner the killing occurred. The assured at once wrote back that his horse had died of wind-panic, and that he wanted his pay at once to buy another. This peculiar state of affairs leads to a suggestion to companies doing a tornado and wind storm business that they might be well to insert a clause similar to those applied to electric light plants in such cases referring to electricity, of course, reading as follows: "It is hereby understood that this company is not liable for wind generated in the property insured."—Chicago Inter Ocean.

What Is Money?

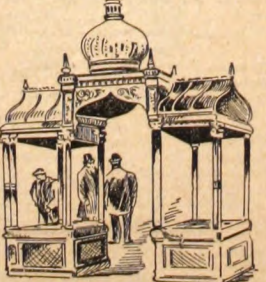

Unfortunately this delicate question was not settled. The case was withdrawn upon the discovery that the articles were worth more than £15, which is the limit of the magistrate's jurisdiction. Proceedings are to be resumed in another firm, however, and American as well as English wives will watch the result with interest.

Faithful Unto Death.

Miss Nancy Marvin, a spinster who died at Monrovia, Ind., recently, at the advanced age of 103 years, was remarkable among women for the fact that for seventy-five years she remained true to the memory of her deceased lover. She was betrothed to Nicholas Hayes, of Baltimore, and the wedding day was set for Oct. 9, 1818. On Oct. 4 the young man died. So warm did Miss Marvin keep her affection for her dead affianced that even when she became an old woman the tears would trickle down her wrinkled face as she talked about him. Miss Marvin was the oldest member of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Indiana, and probably the oldest maiden in the United States.
