LEGISLATIVE DOINGS.

WORK OF THE STATE SOLONS AT THE CAPITAL.

Record of One Week's Business—Measures Presented, Considered and Passed—What Our Public Servants Are Doing—In and Around Legislative Halls.
The Law-Makers.
 The House Wednesday refused to take up the joint resolution to adjourn from Friday to Tuesday, the usual constitutional adjournment until Friday morning. Most of the time was consumed in discussion of World's Fair matters. The Senate passed, by a vote of 85 to 45, the bill which takes \$75,000 of the \$800,000 appropriated two years ago for the Illinois exhibit and building, and distributes that amount among the day-makers, bookkeepers, horticultural and flower-makers' associations, and to defray the expenses of the National Guard at the World's Fair. The bill was then ordered engrossed for third reading. Mr. Nicholas' bill regarding the election and compensation of assessors in cities of over 100 and less than 100,000 inhabitants was passed without objection, after which the Senate adjourned.

In the House Thursday the Senatorial reappointment bill was advanced to third reading, but not until after a discussion which consumed nearly the entire session. The measure to declare the location of Peoria, Aurora, Springfield, Bloomington and Decatur; but upon receipt of the notice of the Senate adjourned. The bill was then ordered engrossed for third reading. The Senate ordered to third reading the bill appropriating \$5,684 for the purchase of land in Springfield, which State property abuts in Springfield, \$6,480 for the same purpose in Ottawa, \$4,401 for the same purpose in Mount Vernon, \$4,000 for land near the State Fair grounds, and \$100,000 for the purchase of land at the State Fair grounds. The bill was then ordered engrossed for third reading. The Senate ordered to third reading the bill appropriating \$100,000 for the purchase of land at the State Fair grounds.

Mr. Morris of Illinois made an attempt in the House Friday to introduce a resolution for sine die adjournment May 23, but objection was made. The Senate joint resolution adjournment until August 1st was recognized by the State as a military academy was adopted, as was the report of the Committee on Canals and Rivers adverse to the survey of the Cache and Kaskaskia Rivers by the Canal Commissioner of the State with a view to reclaiming the swamp lands along their waters. The Senate joint resolution protesting against the ratification of the Russian treaty was referred to the Federal Relations Committee. The State Fair bill was made a special order Tuesday and the bill was passed Tuesday. The House on Wednesday passed a bill for the purpose of amending the Constitution to give the State a right to sue in any court of law. The bill was passed by a vote of 85 to 45.

Curious Causes of Fire.
 Moistened tin turnings and chips have been known to take fire. A rat gnawing at a box of greased friction matches ignited the lot. A running belt which sagged into a mass of greasy waste set fire to the heap by friction. A flood burned one factory by causing a pile of iron filings to oxidize so rapidly as to become intensely heated. A match carelessly dropped beneath a lace curtain was stepped upon, ignited, and instantly the drapery was ablaze. A lens exposed to the sun's rays in an optician's window frequently acts as a burning glass before being noticed. A cockroach crawled from an oil receptacle to a gas jet, where the creature's oily body took fire, and, falling, spread the flames. A stream from a fireman's hose started a second fire while putting out the first, the water having penetrated an adjoining building containing quicklime.

A nail glanced from a carpenter's hammer into the conveyor of raw material in a jute factory, rubbed against the drum and produced a spark, which set fire to the place.

Advantages of Good Roads.
 A country without roads will remain undeveloped, its hidden treasures stored away.

Where poor roads prevail everything else is very apt to be poor, the horse, farmer, and merchant. If two horses haul the load of four, one wagon haul the load of two, one set of harness haul the load of two, one driver serve for two, and six miles instead of three be made in an hour, the aggregate saving would double the net income of the average farmer. This desideratum can only be accomplished by the means of good public roads.

The effect of good public roads upon land value is to increase the value of such lands. Experience has shown that the value of ground is in direct ratio to the good condition of the streets or roads which traverse them. A road system is the means of facilitating intercourse.

Intercommunication is the backbone of business. Good public roads are the primary necessities of civilized life and national prosperity. To Make Marriage Easy. Everybody knows how difficult it is for young people in a big city to form desirable acquaintances with the opposite sex with reference to matrimony. You may meet many young women if they knew any, and young women might make good wives if they knew where suitable husbands could be found. With that practical instinct characteristic of the British, it is proposed now to bring these slighted people together. The scheme is to take most of the large school buildings and turn them into meeting places for those anxious to marry—to let the children have possession of the schools by day and the older people take possession of them at night. It would be easy to have dances, meetings and lectures there, let every one attend who cares to, and in this way bring about a union of loving hearts. The plan is feasible, and the chances are that it will be carried out there. If it should be carried out, it would doubtless follow in the same line.

They Live in the Stone Age.

Cu the little known islands, Bouka and Bougainville, the most northern of the Solomon group, east of New Guinea, the natives have kept almost wholly free from European influences. They are in the stone age, though a very few of them have firearms. They wear little or no clothing, are of the Melanesian race, and, while darker in color than the natives of New Guinea, their habits recall the Polynesians. Their bodies are ten feet long, and they also use lances and clubs.

They have quite a number of industries, and build canoes which Mr. Zoller says could not be excelled by white artisans, and they weave nets and make pottery without the aid of the wheel. Cannibalism, which is always observed in these regions to a greater or lesser extent, is becoming rare among them; if the natives are to be believed.

Many writers have affirmed that these islands throw their dead into the water or cremate them, but Mr. Zoller says he repeatedly saw ceremonies in Bougainville decorated with real stone monuments. This custom cannot be attributed to the influence of Christianity, for missionaries have never yet ventured among these dangerous people, and the natives have only met a few European merchants, most of whom they have slaughtered. Bouka is only about thirty miles long and ten miles wide, but it has a population of about 15,000, and the little islands which are near it are densely peopled.

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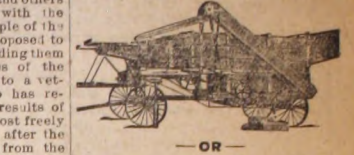

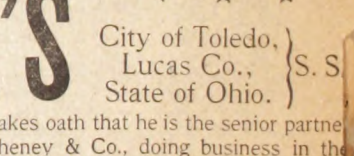
