

IDIOT WITH A MATCH.

CAUSES A FIRE AND PANIC AT UTICA, N. Y.

Another Stupendous Bank Failure in Australia—Canadian's gigantic Scheme for a Waterway—Mexican Murderers to Be Shot—Pope Leo's Reception.

From Far and Near. A disastrous fire visited Utica, N. Y., Tuesday morning. A young man made some purchases in the large dry goods store of J. B. Wells & Co. and just before going out lit a match to light his cigar.

The Bank of Victoria, Melbourne, Australia, has suspended its business. The balance sheet shows deposits of over \$7,000,000. The failure has caused a partial panic. The bank had several branches, and was supposed to be a very strong institution.

E. A. McDonald, of Toronto, Canada, who has been in New York for some weeks, has, it is said, organized a syndicate to acquire an aqueduct in Ontario, Canada, and New York and 900 miles between the West and Liverpool, as compared with the Erie Canal and New York route.

Nearly a year ago an Englishman named John Kelly was shot down from a bush and killed near Saitillo, Mexico. The murder attracted attention throughout Mexico and England owing to the wealth and prominence of the victim.

President Cleveland has issued a rule declining to receive office-seekers who wish for a personal interview. It is reported that the collapse of the revolt in Cuba is due to the Spanish Government's buying of the leaders.

George Bohann, of Trenton, Pa., wishes a wife about forty years old, pretty, and who is also capable of scrubbing, and asks the New York Immigration Commission to make arrangements to bring him a wife. He has been unable to find such a woman in Trenton.

Ward H. Lamon, President Lincoln's private secretary, and who enjoyed the most confidential relations with the great President, died at Martinsburg, W. Va. He had long been in failing health.

A Guadalupe, Mexico, severe earthquake shocks have been experienced during the past ten days, and there is much alarm felt among the people at Acapulco and other towns along the Pacific coast.

At the request of the Secretary of State the Secretary of the Navy has ordered the United States cruiser Atlanta to Graytown, Nicaragua. This step is taken in consequence of the existing revolution in Nicaragua.

Bishop Whipple is seriously ill at Fairbank, Minn. Louisville banks have turned over \$2,200,000 in gold to the United States Treasury.

CRIME AND CASUALTY.

It is rumored that the United States Government will take a hand in the pursuit of the notorious California bandits Evans and Sontag. Under the law Evans and Sontag are outlawed, having openly defied the authorities in their flight, and who have been in the pursuit, and tampered with United States mails.

The immense sheds of the Northwestern Fuel Company at Milwaukee collapsed without warning, burying about twenty men. The sheds were of wood and covered an area 250 by 25 feet. No cause can be ascribed for their collapse.

Sensational developments are coming up in the Carlisle-Luttrell murder case at Sherman, Texas. Gov. Penney has written Sherman, Texas, for a report on Charles Luttrell's case, as a pardon had been asked. Luttrell had divulged information concerning the terrible butchery of women in that vicinity last spring that will probably secure him a reprieve to life imprisonment, or even possibly a pardon in full.

The counterfeiter named H. C. Hunter, who had been for some time in the hands of the Government officers, and in his possession were found a large number of counterfeit tools and material.

The town of Kowal, in Poland, about eighty miles south of Warsaw, has been visited by a destructive conflagration, resulting in the loss of many lives. The town has a population of between three and four thousand.

The German army bill was debated Saturday, and the opposition showed the greatest satisfaction over the defeat of Kaiser Wilhelm's pet bill.

At London, in the action against the Lancet for alleged libel on Dr. Keely, of the late Dr. Keely's counsel to produce from America certificates as to his client's merit and proficiency.
