Examinations. Candidates for Teacher's Certificates will be examined in the following subjects in the order given—Friday beginning at 8:30 A. M. Written Arithmetic, Mental Arithmetic, Geography, Grammar, History, Orthography, Saturday forenoon, Physiology, Pedagogy, Reading and Penmanship. For the first grade in addition to the foregoing the candidate must stand an examination in Botany, Zoology and Philosophy.

The required average for second grade is 80 per cent with a minimum of 70; for the first grade, 90 per cent with a minimum of 75.

Persons not personally known to the Superintendent present references as to moral character. According to the provisions of the law, a fee of \$1, for institute purposes, will be collected from each applicant. The required age for males is 18, for females 17 years.
