

The Eleventh District.

The eleventh congressional district which is composed of Livingston, Bureau, Woodford and LaSalle, with one delegate for every 400 voters will be represented in the next republican convention by 44 delegates divided as follows: Bureau 10; LaSalle 20; Livingston 10; Woodford 4. The democratic congressional convention will be composed of 49 delegates, as follows: Bureau 9; LaSalle 23; Livingston 10; and Woodford 7. The largest city in the district is Streator and it is easy of access to all parts of the district, and will probably be selected by both parties as the place to hold their congressional conventions. The expression of republican papers in the district seems to point to the nomination of T. J. Henderson, of Princeton, as the first republican nominee in the new district. He has served several terms in congress and is a member of the present congress. On the democratic side no name has yet been given conspicuous mention by the rank and file of the party, and as there are a number of available gentlemen in the district, it may be safely said there are no favorites for the place at present.—Fairbury Record.

Obituary.

In the death of George Burns, an old settler, an honorable and esteemed citizen, a true husband and father, and a Christian gentleman, passed from our midst. The end of his earthly life and the beginning of his enlarged immortality, came early Saturday morning, July 15. With the dawning to us of a new earthly day, there dawned on him the heavenly day.

The deceased was born in Alroford, Ashire county, Scotland, June 6, 1818. He was united in holy matrimony to Miss Elizabeth Franklin, at Chester, England, on the 27th of July, 1845. To them were born three sons and four daughters. One son and two daughters are with the father, two sons and two daughters tarry with the mother.

Mr. Burns and family arrived in America July 5, 1850. They settled in Lockport, Ill. From there they removed first to Morris, then to Odell, then back to Morris, then to Dwight, all of Illinois. He witnessed the beginnings of Dwight, even the first stake in the ground that marked her location. The family settled on the home farm in April 1856, in Round Grove township, Livingston county, Illinois. In 1890 Mr. and Mrs. Burns removed to Dwight, where they lived until the time of his death. In 1897 he was converted, gave his heart to God, was baptized and joined the Baptist church. Later, when the Baptist church ceased to maintain its organization in Dwight, he sought a church home in the Presbyterian church. In her folds he died, having lived true and faithful to God and man. In death he grandly triumphed, and passed away in the full assurance of the Christian's faith.

The funeral was held at the late residence in Dwight Saturday morning July 15, Rev. A. M. Conard preaching the sermon. People for miles around showed their high respect for the deceased by attending the obsequies.
