The editor of the Sentinel has obtained the following concise report of the assessed valuation of lands, etc., which your correspondent wishes to reproduce:

The thirty assessors of Livingston county have completed their work and County Clerk George and his deputies have finished the footings of these books and find that the total number of town lots is 10,992 valued at \$1,042,372. The total number of acres of land is 656,107 valued at \$6,437,225. The railroad property of all kinds in the county, both real and personal, on which taxes are assessed but not including rolling stock, is \$8,028. The assessed value of lands is \$4,195 more than last year. The assessed value of town lots is \$20,961 more than last year, but the assessed valuation of all personal property is \$32,535 less than last year. This decrease is due to shrinkage of the value of horses, cattle, carriages and wagons, merchandise on hand, and less money and credits.

There are 28,921 horses in the country with an assessed value of \$16.61 giving a total value for assessment purposes of \$490,336. Cattle of all ages 28,835, assessed value \$152,107. There are 1,037 mules valued at 118,196; 7,999 sheep valued at \$11,544; 26,730 hogs valued at \$40,166; 156 steam engines valued at \$17,425; 152 safes valued at \$3,095; 39 billiard and pool tables valued at \$815; 8,903 carriages and wagons valued at \$49,975; 6,885 watches and clocks valued at \$10,816; 4,433 sewing machines valued at \$14,236; 375 pianos valued at \$11,111; 1,435 melodeons and organs valued at \$10,703; one steam boat valued at \$75.

The merchandise on hand is valued at \$189,499; material and manufactured articles \$3,726; manufacturers tools and implements \$5,366; agricultural tools and implements \$67,855; gold and silver plate and plated ware \$86; diamonds and jewelry \$500; moneys of bank, banker, etc., \$25,904; credits of bank, banker, etc., \$9,510; moneys of other than bank, banker, etc., \$121,312; credits of other than bank, banker, etc., \$1,548,28; bonds and stocks \$2,200 shares of capital stocks, etc., \$40; property of companies and corporations not before enumerated \$615; property of saloons and eating houses \$1,820; household or office furniture \$113,716; investments of real estate, etc., \$5,959; grain of all kinds \$420,081; all other personal property \$27,541; shares of stock of state or national banks \$39,000.

The total assessed value of all personal property is \$2,001,668. The grand total is \$9,500,173. Since the tabulated statement was completed, an additional assessment of \$2,000 on personal property was made in Forrest township and \$18,000 on personal property in Dwight township, which raised the personal property assessment to \$20,021,668. This addition makes the grand total \$15,871 more than last year.
