SPANISH GARRISON AT MELLILLA ATTACKED BY NATIVES.

Muslims Armed with Winchester Repeating Rifles Charge Upon a Few Hundreds of Spanish Soldiers—Pan-American Convention in St. Louis.

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AGAIN FIRED ON RIO.

IS REPEAL BEATEN?

BRAZILIAN REBELS CONTINUE THEIR BOMBARDMENT.

Great Loss of Life is Reported—Bandit Garza Said to Have Attended the Fair—Three Killed in a Freight Wreck at Cincinnati.

From Fair and Near.

A cable message announces that the rebel fleet at Rio Janeiro reopened fire upon the Brazilian capital Sunday night.

At Cincinnati a south-bound fast freight train on the Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis Railway ran into three heavily loaded flat cars, which had been derailed by a local crew.

The United States Supreme Court meets at Washington this month with a docket of 1,023 cases, and it is stated that at the rate of progress and work made in the past year the court might expect in seven years to be reduced to current business.

The steamship Remo, which sailed from Genoa, Aug. 15, with 1,433 emigrants, was wrecked near Rio Janeiro, and the Santa Cruz, which was wrecked in the Canaries, on the return voyage, having been turned back on account of cholera on board.

Joseph S. Hardin, the leader of the Central Missouri rebellion, was held in jail at Salem, Ill., where his parole was also confined.

Edison suggests a new solution of the silver question. He proposes that the Government compress a bushel of wheat into a hard cake the size of a silver dollar and stamp it. This, he says, would represent the value of the wheat.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals at St. Paul handed down a decision in favor of the Transmissouri Freight Association, which association was attacked under the Sherman anti-trust act as illegal.

The schooner Valkyrie, which sailed from Sydney, N. E. W., for New York five weeks ago, was wrecked in the hurricane that prevailed soon after she started out.

Rebel leaders were made prisoners of war. Rev. Benjamin Jewett, English scholar and divine, died at New York. He was 76 years old.

The Starr gang headed a mutiny in the Fort Smith, Ark., prison. One convict was killed.

Wife-murderer Nelson, who escaped from the Sedalia, Mo., jail, has been heard from. Efforts will be made to get him.

Three negro miners, who shot a white youth near Pittsburg, Kan., are in danger of being taken from jail and lynched.

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APPARENTLY AUTHENTIC RUMORS SO DECLARE.

Unanimous Quiet Reigns in the Senate—Details of the Alleged Program—Getting Ready to Tackle the Tariff—Vote Coming Soon.

A Masterly Inactivity.

CONGRESS has a gasp been dull as a garden hoe for several days. Nobody has been hitting, no warwhoops have alarmed the shivering air, no blood has flown and no scapulae have been raised.

The Senate appears willing to compromise, while others in the Senate are inactive there are all sorts of opinions expressed.

and many rumors are all as to what will be the final outcome. One of these is that the unconditional repeal of the Sherman law is beaten, and this, according to the opinion of many, beyond a doubt.

The program is your correspondent sees it, contemplates the passage of a bill through the Senate. The concurrence of the House in that bill is to be had, and then a recess taken for the period of three weeks in order that tariff legislation may be formulated.

The Ways and Means Committee has taken up until the tariff is ready. If the compromise financial measure be passed by common consent Federal elections will be permitted to lie over till the regular session.

Senate and How's.

In the Senate, Friday, Mr. Cameron, of Pennsylvania, introduced a bill to amend the act of 1844 authorizing the Philadelphia, in favor of legislation to preserve the protective character of the tariff and the silver dollar.

The petition favors the admission of American silver bullion to coinage upon the payment by the owner of a difference between the London price of bullion and its value when coined. It was printed as a document.

Saturday closed the eighth week of fruitless debate in the Senate, and as before, the repeal of the Sherman law was the subject of attention. But little other business, and the silver dollar was the only subject of the House lasted only three hours.

Mr. Sawyer of Texas, Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, introduced a bill to extend the time for the completion of the work of the eleventh census until June 30, 1894.

The repeal bill was taken up in the Senate on Monday, and Senator Dubois commenced a remark by Senator Gorman criticizing the resolution to postpone legislation on the tariff and finance.

Senator Dubois denied that the resolution was introduced to obstruct the repeal bill. Senator Washburn announced that he had been informed by Senator Squires that he was in favor of unconditional repeal.

It is understood, is a vote gained for the repeal side. Senator Kyle then spoke against repeal. Mr. Johnson, Democrat, introduced a bill to appropriate \$50,000 for the purchase of a site and an addition to the public building at Cleveland.

The Federal elections repeal bill was introduced by Senator Dismore, Democrat, of Arkansas, argued in its favor.
