WORST GALE IN YEARS

A TERRIBLE TEMPEST SWEEPS OVER THE LAKES.

Heavy Loss of Life Is Known to Have Occurred—Enormous Damage Done—Stanchest Boats Are Driven to Shelter—Worst Not Yet Known.

The entire chain of lakes was swept Sunday and Saturday night by a north-west gale whose severity has not been exceeded during the season of navigation for the past ten years. The same wind which drove vessels on the beach on every lee shore also leveled telegraph wires, and reports of wrecks in the chain of lakes are reaching the outside world, particularly from out-of-the-way localities. The list of wrecks, in proportion to the number of vessels which were out in the gale, is larger perhaps than in the history of the later-day mariners. That there has been a large loss of life now seems certain, but it may be several days before it is known just how many sailors perished. Eighteen persons, the entire crew of the propeller *Denn Richmond*, are given up for lost in the storm on Lake Erie. The corpses of three men have been washed ashore off Van Buren Point, near Dunkirk. The shore of the lake is strewn with wreckage and merchandise, and, according to Buffalo dispatches, the waves are hourly yielding up in further evidence of the fate to which the *Richmond* has gone. On one of the bodies papers were found which showed it to be that of Logan, the engineer. The others were deck-hands. The signboard of the *Richmond* washed ashore about 10 miles from the place where the wreckage were cast upon the beach, leaving no doubt of the fate of the boat. The *Richmond* was the property of the Botsfords, of Port Huron. She was built in 1864. She had on board a cargo of merchandise consigned to Buffalo.

The storm was the severest known to the eastern of Buffalo in twenty-five years. The rain fell so heavily that pilots could not see 100 feet ahead of their vessel. All incoming vessels have stories to tell of the violence of the storm.

Big Schooner Goes Down.

The four-masted schooner *Minnehaha* was wrecked in the gulf at Arcadia, twenty miles north of Manistee. She was on board—six persons—except the captain, William Packer, were lost. Capt. Packer swam ashore with the help of a plank, a distance exceeding a mile. The sailors also attempted the perilous journey, but became exhausted and drowned. The *Minnehaha*'s saving crew made three unsuccessful attempts to reach the *Minnehaha*, but the boat filled with water each time. The fourth effort was successful, but there was no one aboard, all having then been swamped overboard.

The *Minnehaha* was sighted by a man on the bluff at Starke, who jumped on his horse and rode at a furious pace through the storm to Onekama, in order to notify the life-saving crew at Manistee. A telegram brought the life-savers on a special train from that place, and in the afternoon the *Richmond* was sighted. A life-saving apparatus was loaded on wagons and started through the woods to the scene of the wreck. The rain was blinding, and numberless trees had fallen across the narrow roadway through the forest. The progress of the life-savers was exceedingly slow, and it was nearly midnight when they reached the high sand bluff overlooking the lake at Stanke. The life-saving crew from Frankfort gained the bluff at dark, but even then it was too late.

Dispatches from all points along the western shore of Lake Superior and the eastern end of Lake Superior indicated that the storm increased greatly in violence as night came on, and at midnight the storm was at its height. At numerous places the wind registered from fifty-two to sixty miles an hour at the United States signal stations. By that time the lake fleets had generally succeeded in getting into shelter.

Wind and Tide in the South.

The town of Georgetown, on the coast of South Carolina, caught the full fury of the storm, which left death and destruction in its track. Owing to the wreck of telegraph lines but meager reports of the great damage have been received. At least nineteen persons are now known to have been drowned at Magnolia Beach, where every house was swept from its foundation, penning in the inmates until death relieved their tortures.

At Pauley's Island, a summer resort twelve miles from Georgetown, the tide rose three feet, sweeping away most of the residences, the inmates saving their lives by getting to the shore.

No lives are reported lost on this island nor on Dehorcan, but several houses were washed from their foundations and drifted to sea.

JOY FOR SILVER MEN.

GENATE FINALLY TIRES OUT AND ADJOURNS.

After Being in Continuous Session for Forty-three Hours a Quorum Cannot Be Found and at 1:45 Friday Morning Voorhees Ends the Test.

Bad for Healers.

The Senate slept with its boots on Wednesday night. The much advertised contest of physical endurance had begun, and the owl Senators seemed determined to sit it out. All day long there were evidences of preparation for the fight. Few Senators were in the chamber, but a glance into the cloak rooms and a peep into the committee rooms showed many of them sleeping on the couches and sofas, husbanding their strength for a siege which they appreciated would test most severely every energy which they could muster. Forces on both sides of the battle were divided so as to be able to give each other relief by taking up the defense of their position in turn. The great number of employes of the Senate were likewise separated into relays, in anticipation of continuous work.

The first round of the struggle, at 8 o'clock in the evening, was marked by a challenge from Mr. Dubois, in which he defied the endurance of the majority to silver or gold had been approved—the question whether the majority or the minority was to rule in this country. Mr. Butler, of South Carolina, made a vehement appeal to Mr. Voorhees to throw himself "in the breach," and by returning to his early love, free silver, put an end to the contest. The Senate settled down for an all-night siege.

As the evening wore on it became apparent no one in the chamber had any idea the test of endurance would result in anything but failure. The maneuvering appeared to be solely with putting blame upon the other side. The Republicans, though taking credit to themselves for having offered closure and a legal, orderly way out of the deadlock, were anxious to leave the chamber and thus lay themselves open to the charge of having broken the quorum. The Democrats, repealers and anti-repealers alike were actuated by the same desire. They stuck to their seats or to the cloak-rooms until the test was over, and the quorum should be broken, if at all, by the disappearance of Republicans. It was a case in which two doctors appeared to be sitting up with a dying patient, each determined to be in at the death and to charge responsibility therefor upon the other fellow.

The Sen to Adjourn.

All night Wednesday night, all day Thursday and until nearly 2 o'clock Friday morning the stars and stripes floated from the top of the dome of the big dome of the Capitol, indicating that the "dignified branch" of Congress was still in session. At 1:45 o'clock Friday morning, after a continuous session of forty-three hours, the Senate adjourned, on motion of Senator Voorhees. The end had been foreseen for three hours, as one Senator after another abandoned the Senate from sheer exhaustion. At midnight a roll-call disclosed three short of a quorum. It took forty minutes to secure the necessary three. They were Palmer, Berry, and Blackwell. Ten minutes later the quorum was broken again, and this time it took an hour and ten minutes to find a sufficient number for business.

During the long wait Voorhees said that he would consent to a recess, but he would not yield to adjournment. His admission was taken to mean that the fight would not be over until a quorum been secured than it was broken for the third time. This time Sergeant-at-arms Bright made written report to the Senate that at the homes of sixteen absent Senators it was reported that they "were not in." He specified many names of absent Senators, but was only too plain that the Sergeant-at-arms' report was designed as a pretext to make adjournment natural and necessary. The last word of the report had hardly left the clerk's lips when Voorhees was on his feet. "Mr. President," he said, "in a voice without treacher or emotion, there need no comment on the meaning of that report. It tells its own story. I move that the Senate adjourn." The vote was put and carried without a dissenting voice and the fate of the silver repeal bill was sealed.

Who has been done is difficult to tell. The silver men have now shown their ability to dictate terms, and it is thought the end will be a compromise on the lines of the Harris amendment.

Mr. Morris' Amendment.

The amendment introduced by Mr. Harris provides:

1. For the coinage of all the silver bullion in the treasury, representing the government's share, into full legal-tender dollars at the rate of 300 to one.
2. That all paper notes or certificates of less denomination than \$1 shall be redeemed in full legal-tender dollars at the rate of 300 to one.

4. That the \$20 and \$50 gold pieces shall no longer be current, but shall be retired at the treasury shall be received as eagles and double eagles.
5. That the holders of standard silver dollars shall be able to exchange such dollars on presentation for full legal-tender dollars at par, in quantities as such silver dollars, which shall be paid for their redemption.

By means of cleverly worded advertisements or "advertising propositions," the man who more than any other lives very comfortably at the expense of honest folk. One of the classes recently he has had a certain firm would give 150 useful household articles in return for \$1 and the names of ten persons to whom catalogues could be sent. He sent the money, and received by return mail 150 useful articles worth all at all 25 cents. Even the catalogue had to acknowledge that each one of the 150 articles was a "useful household article," but he felt that he had been swindled and made the matter public. This scheme, which apparently does not come directly under the law governing the obtaining of money under false pretenses, recalls several others of a similar nature. One of the most barefaced and at the same time, one of the most alluring offers, was made several years ago by a picture frame who offered to make both ends meet by working at his bench. At that time a pretty lithograph in several tints was being sold through the country for \$2.00. The impetuous frame maker saw this piece of work, and soon evolved a scheme which promised to double his profits. He sent circulars broadcast throughout the country to the effect that he had copies of the popular picture in twelve colors, and would sell single copies for the remarkably low price of \$3.50, including a heavy frame. There was a rush all over the country for the picture. The man found it impossible to fill his orders. He had to take in a partner and move to more commodious quarters. When the picture was sent it was seen that it was only in one color, generally black. In the explanatory letter which accompanied every box the wily man dwelt on the beauties of the picture; he trusted that the color would suit, but if it didn't, as he had the same picture in eleven other colors, it might be exchanged for a green or yellow one; by the payment of expressage and a small sum to cover the expense of postage. The fellow who thought out this scheme carried it on for several years. He was finally brought up with a sharp turn by the postoffice officials, but not before he had accumulated a fortune of nearly \$1,000,000.

One day, however, an enterprising gentleman of the name of Itzig applied to the merchant for his hand, and his daughter.
