

HONDURAS IN FOR IT.

MUST EXPLAIN HER MISCELLANEOUS SHOOTING.

Gold cannot for Democrats in the Election Returns—Scores Lose Their Lives in Two Disasters—An Ohio Counterfeit Caught.

Told in Four Words. The Cabinet meeting on Tuesday was interrupted by a dispatch from Honduras stating that the American flag was first hoisted by direction of the President of the republic. The President inquired of Secretary Herbert as to what United States man-of-war was nearest the port. Mr. Herber replied that the Alliance was at Gortono, a hundred miles from the port. Orders will probably be wired to the commander to proceed at once to Amapula. Minister Baker will also be wired for further particulars. The offending country will be held to a strict account and compelled to make prompt and satisfactory reparation for any insult it has offered. Until further particulars have been received, however, nothing can be done except to order the Alliance to sail at once.

Latest returns from the elections indicate that Jackson defeats Hotes in Iowa, McKim in New York, in Ohio, Russell loses to Greenhall in Massachusetts, and the Republican ticket is uniformly successful in New York. Chicago elections also return Republican candidates with possibly one exception. In the Dakota general election, Republican Judge A. V. Anderson defeated the lightness of the vote.

Toronto, Ont., dispatch: By the burning of the steamer Fraser on Lake Nipissing eighteen persons lost their lives. The disaster occurred near Goose Island, and in spite of the most strenuous efforts to save the lives of the passengers, the steamer was completely destroyed. Lake Nipissing is situated near the head of Lake Huron, near Ontario, nearly midway between it and the Ottawa river, and it is supposed that the steamer was in regular service on the lake. Only the most meager particulars are obtainable. The steamer Albatross, of the Western Transit Company, and the steamer Philadelphia, of the Anchor Line, collided on Lake Huron, off Point Aux Barques, at 2 o'clock Tuesday morning in a dense fog. The Albatross was taken in tow by the Philadelphia, but sank within an hour. The latter was hoisted on board the Anchor Line. Shortly afterward the Philadelphia went down in 200 feet of water. The crews took to the life boats. One had twenty-three persons on board, and reached the shore in safety. The other boat contained twenty-four persons. It was capsized and all on board were lost.

At Akron, Ohio, the police captured Richard Hulet, aged thirty-five, in the saloon of John Koerber. Hulet called for drinks and threw down a counterfeit dollar. Koerber refused it and Hulet offered a cent piece, also counterfeit. Koerber then grabbed Hulet and sent for the police. At the station Hulet confessed to having purchased 300 bogus dollars of William Devitt, 8 South street, New York City, for \$112. The "quack," he said, was hidden at the residence of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Nigh, who lives on an island in the lake. There a satchel containing the coin was found. Mrs. Nigh had some of the coin in her possession and so had David Radcliffe. Radcliffe was arrested. Hulet claimed he had received the 50-cent piece which gave him away in chance for a bogus dollar.

Several brigands were overcome by smoke at a blaze in Rosenshick Brothers' millinery store in New York. Loss, \$60,000. Near Ingram, O. T., a negro burglar cut the throats of three men in order to secure \$160.

Refusing to surrender a passenger to the Honduran government, a Pacific mail steamer was fired on by a Honduran gunboat. A Scottish Free Church mission at Milan, East Africa, was attacked, and an officer and two sheikhs fatally wounded.

During religious services at Willow Grove schoolhouse, near Martinsville, Ind., Bedford Kent shot the throat of Noah King. With a timber for a battering-ram, Christian workers broke down the door of a building in Madison, Wis., and set fire to it.

The boilers in the Elrod Mills, at Sausalito, Cal., exploded with terrific force. Superintendent Richard Elrod and Engineer Charles Dickinson were almost instantly killed. Robert Bullock and Phillip Elrod received injuries which will probably result in their death. The mills were damaged to the extent of \$20,000. No reason is known for the explosion, but it is supposed to have been because of lack of water in the boilers. Dittmar's dynamite factory, at May Chester, N. Y., blew up. The factory was demolished. It is not known whether or not any lives were lost.

Judge Johnson of the Circuit Court at Milwaukee, has declared null and void all the sixty-seven judgments against officers and directors of the failed Plankinton and South Side Savings banks. The Court holds that the grand jury lost jurisdiction by continuing its proceedings for a month beyond the term of court, which it was impeached.

Lyceum Theater, one of the finest buildings in Memphis, was destroyed.

Falling walls crushed three adjoining buildings.

A thousand pennants now numbered among the dead, all shot and mangled by the explosion at Eastender.

CRIME AND CASUALTY.

Daniel Wrimouth, while returning from a frolic at Coalburg, Ala., passed over some burning coals. His foot slipped and he fell into one of the fiery furnaces and was burned to death.

J. K. Payne, a farmer of Winston County, Alabama, who had given evidence against moonshiners, was shot from ambush.

At Bridgeport, Conn., Shang Burns and Michael Murphy fought in a saloon over the ownership of a pipe. Murphy struck Burns with a beer glass, fracturing his skull. Burns will die. Murphy escaped.

At Redmond, the worst man who ever lived in Charlotte County, Virginia, was hanged by a mob.

The Doylestown express ran into the Germantown railroad at Philadelphia and Reading Express at Nicetown. One man was killed and three injured. The result of a wreck on the Reading, near Philadelphia, caused by a fox.

By the explosion of a boiler at New York half a dozen men were killed and nearly a score injured.

By a passenger market train running on the freight tracks at Philadelphia James Hamilton was killed.

The fast express train, No. 51, of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern, known as the cannon ball, was held up and robbed by seven masked men at Oliphant, Ariz. The train was stopped at New York, Friday night. Passenger Conductor J. P. McNally was shot and killed while trying to protect his train. Oliphant is a small lumber town of about 300 inhabitants, situated in a lonely timber district in White County, N. C. The immense planing mill and lumber yard of the James Hordman Lumber Company was destroyed by fire at Zanesville, Ohio. Loss, \$75,000. Fire started in Clinton Elder's billiard-room at Parker, Pa., burning down the billiard-room, postoffice, Mobley's furnishing store, Wilkins & Fullerton's millinery store, Cohen's Building, Mrs. W. A. Boardland's photograph gallery, the Western Union Telegraph office, Lewis' restaurant, Mrs. Pontius' Building, Blair's stationery store and Clark Wilson's variety store. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

A Newberg, Mo., fire destroyed the following buildings: Becker's barber shop, Todd Bros' store, Clint Huckles' store, Root's saloon, Hillock's market, and Dr. Rodman's office. Nothing was saved from any of the above. Total loss not yet known.
