A telegram from the authorities of Huron county, Mich., to Sheriff Daniels on Friday last, stated that one Julia Le Broun, was under arrest there for the murder of Enio Talantio at Central City, in 1891, against whom the Grundy county grand jury had returned an indictment. Le Broun fled the country after committing the deed and this was the first intimation of his whereabouts. Charles Scurrah, of Central City, was sent to identify the man and reported that the right party had been apprehended. Gov.
