



HEATHER LAD.

The Dwight Kennels.

Quite a number of our readers are aware that we have in our midst one of the finest Gordon setter kennels in the country, but many more are not. The dog business has increased rapidly all over the world in the last twenty years, until to-day it is considered one of the great industries and hundreds of thousands of dollars are invested in it. Owners have their favorite breeds, and a large number make a specialty of that breed and try to excel others. Mr. J. R. Oughton, while in England, Ireland and Scotland last season, became very much interested in Gordon setters, and while there purchased Heather Lad, about two years old, one of the finest of the breed of Gordons, and brought him home with him. His judgment proved excellent. There are several bench shows held in this country and Canada every year, where the very best animals are brought and premiums offered. Heather Lad won the second prize at Edenborough, Scotland, having been beaten by his sire only; won first at Chicago last year in the open class, there being no challenge class, beating such well-known champions as Ivanhoe, Leo B, and others; won first at Lexington, Ky., and special for best Gordon setter dog, again defeating Ivanhoe and others; and also won first at Toronto, Canada.

Heather Lad comes from a stock of noted winners, his sire, Champion Heather Nap, having won some fifty odd prizes in Scotland, England and Ireland. Champion Heather Grouse, Lad's grandsire, won over one hundred prizes in the same countries, a larger number than all the Gordon setters of his day. Lad's dam, Heather Rose, was also a noted winner. Following are partial descriptions of the remaining animals comprising the Dwight kennels:

Dwight Etie is a young animal, about seven months old, sired by Heather Lad. Sadie H. has a fine head, nice

coat, good tan markings, good legs and body, and is sure to be a winner.

Dwight Sadie, about the same age, is a nicely proportioned animal, good head and coat, and has bright prospects.

Heather Lad the second, resembles Heather Lad the first, and the father will have to look out for his laurels when the son gets age and experience.

Dwight Rose, about seven months old, is one of the prettiest animals in the country, and if she holds her own will surely be a winner.

Dwight Don, about eight months old, is of good bone, large, useful dog, and will make his mark.

Sadie H, about four years old, is the dam of the first four mentioned, is a fine animal and has an excellent record.

Dwight Queen, dam of Dwight Don, is a very fine animal.

This completes the list of as fine a lot of Gordon setters as there is anywhere.

Star, a handsome fox terrier, owned by Mrs. J. R. Oughton, is also a very pretty and fine animal.

All these animals are registered, and also entered in the great bench show under the auspices of the Chicago Kennel Club, this week in Chicago. Ame Orr has been in charge of the Dwight kennels for some time, and devotes his entire time to it. The kennels are located near Mr. Orr's residence, and have been visited during the past year by thousands of people.

The animals displayed at the bench show in Chicago this week, will have a cash value of more than \$100,000, and Mr. Oughton's kennel alone is worth to-day at least \$10,000.

Heather Lad's portrait, which we publish in this issue, has been published in such sporting papers as the Forest and Stream, American Field, etc., and those papers give him a great send off.

The show in Chicago opened Wednesday, the 13th, and if the prizes are awarded in time they will be published in another part of this paper.

Section No. 1, of Chapter No. 72, relating to an Ordinance of the Village of Dwight, Regulating Water Rates and Supplies.
Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, Ill., that Section No. 1, of Chapter No. 72, is hereby amended to read as follows:
