The Democratic state convention is set for June 25 and 26 at Springfield, Ill.

The Republican State Central committee will meet in Chicago April 10, and it is expected it will be one of the largest meetings held for years.

The Illinois Steel company at Joliet and South Chicago are now running and giving employment to about 6000 men. The average reduction in wages is one-third all along the line, but the men had to work.
