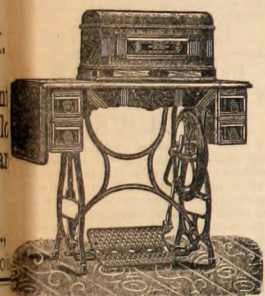

Anti-License Nominations.

The caucus held last Friday evening at the town house to place in nomination candidates for the coming municipal election was composed of representative citizens and was very harmonious, and excellent selections were made. The caucus was open to all who wished to maintain anti-license in the community. Several candidates were named for each office and everyone was given a chance to name whoever he pleased. B. A. Buck was chosen chairman and Geo. S. Baker clerk.

The following gentlemen were named for president: F. A. Haise, L. A. Naffziger, Geo. N. Flagler, C. Barr and J. P. McWilliams.

The first ballot was informal and resulted as follows: Haise 54, Naffziger 14, Flagler 25, Barr 5, McWilliams 7.

Informal ballot: Haise 57, Naffziger 13, Flagler 34, Barr 1, McWilliams 5. Mr. Haise having received a majority of the votes cast, on motion of Flagler, seconded by Naffziger, the nomination was made unanimous.

Those named for clerk were Frank L. Smith, E. T. Miller, L. A. Naffziger.

The first ballot resulted in the nomination of Smith, who got 64 votes out of 109, Miller having 22, Naffziger 21 and Jens Knudsen 2. The nomination was made unanimous.

The following gentlemen were named for trustees: Eugene Flagler, John Geis, L. A. Naffziger, Will T. Scott, John Koehler, George Orr, John Stewart and G. N. Flagler.

It was moved and carried that the three receiving the highest number of votes should be the nominees. The first ballot resulted as follows: Flagler 61, Geis 57, Naffziger 55, Stewart 48, Scott 45, Orr 31, Koehler 10. The nominations of Flagler, Geis and Naffziger were made unanimous.

John Thompson was nominated by acclamation for police magistrate, everyone acknowledging that he is the best man for the place in the town.

THE CANDIDATES.

Frank A. Haise has been a resident of Dwight for about seven years with the exception of a short time he was in business at Lincoln, Ill., his old home. He was agent for Dwight for the C. & A. railroad company for a number of years, and was one of the most thorough railroad men and best business men in their employ. After he returned to Dwight, at the solicitation of Major C. J. Judd, who knew of Mr. Haise's business ability, he went into the employ of The Leslie E. Keeley Co. as a bookkeeper, and has been advanced to the very responsible position of cashier. One year ago Mr. Haise was elected village clerk, running way ahead of anyone on his ticket. He is thoroughly posted as to the business of the village, and no better man can be found in Dwight for president than Mr. Haise. He is conservative and careful in everything. Mr. Haise owns one of the finest homes in Dwight.

Frank L. Smith, candidate for clerk, is the junior member of the enterprising real estate firm of Ketcham & Smith, and one of the most popular young men in Dwight. He is a hust-

ling business man and will make an excellent clerk.

Eugene Flagler is the senior member of the hardware firm of Flagler & Potter and well-known as a successful, level-headed business man.

John Geis has been on the board for the past two years and has been chairman of the water works committee, and has proved one of the most valuable members. It was only at the solicitation of friends who knew his worth that he was induced to accept a re-nomination.

L. A. Naffziger is the well-known cashier of the Bank of Dwight, and is acknowledged by all to be one of the best financiers in the city. He will be a valuable acquisition to the board.

John Thompson, the nominee of the caucus for police magistrate, has held the position for a long time, and proved himself to be a well posted, fearless official, and much credit is due him for imposing fines on the malt venders when brought before him until they were glad to get out of town most any way and stay out.

No better ticket was ever nominated in Dwight and they will be elected by a large majority.

THE OTHER ONE.

The so-called citizens' caucus was in great contrast to the anti-license. It was a Fox caucus. Fox called it to order and nominated Frank Bell for chairman, and then run it himself. Some one nominated Fox, and closing the nominations, put the motion and Fox was nominated. There was no other way to do. Someone then nominated Henry McLane for clerk, and then someone else suggested Frank Smith. The latter name roused Fox's ire, and he jumped to his feet and said he wouldn't run on the same ticket with Smith and that if he (Smith) was elected he (Fox) would refuse to serve. That would, indeed, be too bad.

McLane, of course, was nominated, because Fox said so.

Fox then got up and pulled a list of names for trustees out of his pocket and said he had been requested to read them. The clerk read them and immediately someone moved the nominations close. They closed them, and a vote was taken and Sam McLane, Ed Hahn and Mr. Sterrett received the highest number of votes and were declared the nominees for trustees. The latter was not present. Sam Lower was then nominated for police magistrate.

Fox said he didn't know whether to thank the caucus or not, as he didn't want the nomination, but would accept.

It was evident he didn't want the nomination the way he was nominated, from the fact that he had inferred that he was the only man to lead the afflicted people of Dwight out of the wilderness.

It is more modern than the old one which had been in use in Dwight for many years, and is easier of access and handier to work in. The old outfit, however, was fixed up in excellent shape and was kept so by Mr. Parsons. The latter rented the old outfit to Mr. Kelagher until such time as the new one could be used, and workmen were there all night Monday night.

When the new outfit is painted and varnished up, it will present a handsome appearance, and the office will be in nice shape again.

New Houses.
