Examinations. Candidates for teachers' certificates will be examined on the following branches in the order given: Friday, beginning at 8:30 a. m.

Written Arithmetic, Mental Arithmetic, Geography, Grammar, History and Orthography, on Saturday forenoon. Physiology, Pedagogy, Reading and Penmanship. For the first grade, in addition to the foregoing, Botany, Zoology and Philosophy are given.

The required average for a second grade is 80 per cent, with a minimum of 70; for a first grade, an average 80 per cent, with a minimum of 75. Persons not personally known to the Superintendent must furnish references as to moral character. According to the provisions of the law, an institute fee of \$1 will be collected from each applicant. The required age is 18 for males and 17 for females.
