At the Wednesday meeting none of the officers were present for some unexplained reason and Hon. M. M. Riley was called upon to preside at the meeting, which he did with great credit to himself and to the entire satisfaction of everyone present.

The following officers were elected Tuesday morning: Pres., Ed. C. Turner, Macon, Mo.; 1st vice pres., R. M. Combe, Chicago; 2nd vice pres., T. W. Leggett, Willow Hill, Ill.; B. W. Walley, of Kansas City, Mo., was appointed sergeant-at-arms.

Rev. Nathaniel Butler who was a member of the July '93 class, died at Burlington, Wis., last Wednesday. He was Vice-President Hamlin's private secretary from 1861 to 1865. He also served in the Maine legislature in 1880. The deceased was 70 years of age.

Hon. M. M. Riley made an eloquent and forcible talk at the club Monday morning. Mr. Riley would make an excellent presiding officer and should be honored with the office, the affairs of No. 1 would most certainly be advanced under his administration.

BLOOMINGTON, ILLINOIS, TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY, JUNE 13 AND 14, 1894.

The matter of representation was recently decided at a meeting of the executive board of the Keeley League to be the same as last year, Five (5) Delegates from each league in the State. The matter of alternates, as to whether they shall be the same number as the delegates, is left with the local leagues.

The matter of delegates from auxiliaries was recently decided to be the same as last year, Two (2) delegates for every 25 members, and One (1) additional delegate for each major fraction of twenty-five.

All fraternal organizations are invited to send delegations. Such delegations will be entitled to seats in the Convention, except at executive sessions, but will not be entitled to vote or take part in the proceedings, except by a unanimous vote of the regular delegates.

The Keeley Leagues and Auxiliaries of the state are especially requested to send delegates to this Convention as business of great importance to every "Graduate" and Auxiliary lady will come before the meeting.

The Executive Boards would most emphatically request that every League and Auxiliaries not holding regular meetings to wake up and arouse the interest and not let organizations which mean so much
