## Republican County Convention.

The Republican voters of Livingston County are hereby notified that there will be a county convention held at the Court-house in Pontiac, Ill., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices: County Judge, County Clerk, Sheriff, County Treasurer and County Superintendent of Schools; selecting 13 delegates to the State Convention; delegates to the Congressional Convention; delegates to the Legislative Convention, re-organizing the County Central Committee, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

Republicans residing in the various townships in said county are requested to meet at the place where the various townships were held, in their respective townships, on Saturday, July 14, 1894, at 3 p. m., and select delegates from such towns to said convention.

The town caucus shall remain open for at least one hour, and as much longer as a majority of the voters present may designate, and in case the voters of any township shall desire to change the time of holding said caucus, they are at liberty to do so providing they give ten days' notice of the time such caucus shall be held. The basis of the representation has been fixed at one delegate for each twenty votes cast for Harrison in 1892, and one additional for each fraction of eleven votes over, on Saturday, July 14, 1894, at 3 p. m., and select delegates from such towns to said convention.
