BAKERS' BREAD.

A Few Facts About a Somewhat Familiar Article of Food.

Dwight—stand as assessed. Pontiac—deduct 10 cent. Fairbury—add 16 cent.

Flanagan—deduct 9 cent. Odell—deduct 6 cent. Forrest—add 11 cent.

Saunemin—deduct 2 cent. Emington—add 5 cent. All other village lots to stand as assessed.
