

Supervisors' Proceedings.

Record of the Proceedings, Orders and Resolutions of the Board of Supervisors of Livingston County, State of Illinois, at the Regular Meeting, held on the Second Monday in July, A. D. 1894.

Board of Supervisors of Livingston County met at three o'clock p. m., and was called to order by the clerk.

On motion, M. W. Moulton was elected temporary chairman.

The roll being called, the following members were found to be present:

Gibbons moved that the board now proceed to ballot for the election of permanent chairman, and that the first ballot be informal.

Motion carried.

Potter moved that the temporary chairman appoint three tellers.

Motion carried.

Whereupon the temporary chairman appointed as tellers, Potter, Cornwell and Bullard.

The informal ballot resulted: M. Cleary 11 votes, M. W. Moulton, 6 votes, J. E. Morrow 5 votes, W. E. Thompson 3 votes, Austin Gibbons 3 votes, Thos. A. McKenzie 1 vote, Wm. W. Sears 1 vote, N. J. Myer 1 vote.

The first formal ballot resulted: M. Cleary 27 votes, Austin Gibbons 1 vote, A. Crabb 1 vote, W. E. Thompson 1 vote, M. W. Moulton 1 vote.

M. Cleary having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared by Temporary Chairman Moulton to be duly elected chairman of the board for the ensuing year.

Whereupon Mr. Cleary assumed the chair and addressed the board briefly.

Morrow moved that a committee on fees and salaries be added to the list of standing committees.

Motion carried.

A communication from the Chicago, Wilmington & Vermilion Coal Co., addressed to Sheriff Coe, demanding protection for the company's property situated in Newtown township, from threatened violence, and stating that Livingston county would be held responsible for any damage said property received from such cause, was by the sheriff presented before the board, and on motion of Gibbons a motion thereon was deferred until 9 o'clock a. m. to-morrow.

Myer moved that the special building committee heretofore appointed at the February meeting, 1894, consisting of Morrow, Thompson, Crabb, Cleary and McDowell be continued until the completion of the new county house.

Motion carried.

Myer moved that the name of the standing committee heretofore known as the "committee on poor house and farm" be changed to "committee on county house and farm."

Motion carried. On motion of Moulton the board adjourned until 9 o'clock p. m.

MONDAY, July 9th, 1894, 5 p. m. Board met pursuant to adjournment, Chairman Cleary presiding, who announced a quorum present.

The chairman announced the names of the committee on equalization, to-wit: Gibbons, Clark, Guernsey, Bergan, Mills, Potter, Cornwell, Bullard, Freehill, and stated that the other standing committees would be announced to-morrow morning.

Morrow moved that a special committee of five be appointed by the chairman for the purpose of fixing election districts and appointing election judges where required.

Motion carried. Myer moved that the committee on equalization be requested to report to-morrow morning as to classification of lands and city and town lots.

Motion carried. On motion of Clark the board adjourned until 9 o'clock a. m. to-morrow.

Motion carried. The following report from the committee on equalization was read: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Livingston county, Ill.:

Your committee on equalization would beg leave to make the following classification of lands and villages:

VILLAGES. Dwight stand as assessed. First class—Pontiac and Fairbury. Second class—Flanagan, Odell, Forrest, Emington, Chatsworth, Saunemin.

Balance of villages to remain as assessed, and we recommend that there be a difference of 50c per acre between each class of lands. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Motion to amend lost. Original motion carried and the report adopted as read.

The following report from A. C. Norton, county attorney, together with bill attached for \$90.00, for services the past year, was read and on motion of Hack said report was adopted and bill allowed:

To the Board of Supervisors of Livingston county: Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report of my acts and doings as your attorney for the past year.

At the May term, 1894, of the county court, the Indiana, Illinois and Iowa railway company objected to judgment against its property for the corporation tax within the village of Dwight. Mr. McMillid assisted me in resisting these objections, and after a sharp contest, the objections were overruled and judgment rendered against the property of the railroad company for the amount of taxes. From this judgment the railroad company has taken an appeal, and the bill of exceptions is now nearly made up.

At the same term of court, the Chicago and Alton railroad company filed objections to judgment for taxes against its property for a portion of the school taxes in the village of Dwight and in the village of Odell, claiming that the levy was in excess of the statutory limit. The company also filed objections to judgment for the taxes assessed by the local assessor against the lots in the village of Dwight upon which their round house is situated, claiming that it had been already assessed by the State Board of Equalization and that the assessment by the local assessor was a double assessment. The court overruled the objections to the school tax and they have since been paid. The court sustained the objections to the tax assessed against the round house, and I took the orders for an appeal, but I think the amount involved is so small that it is not advisable to perfect the appeal.

At the same term of court the Toledo, Peoria and Western railroad company filed objections to judgment for a portion of its school tax in the village of Chatsworth, on the ground that the levy exceeded the statutory limit. This objection was sustained by the court, and I took the orders for an appeal therefrom, but I do not think it advisable to perfect the appeal, as the expense would be more than the amount of taxes involved.

At the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors, I was appointed to collect the past due fees the county in the circuit clerk's office, by the issuing of fee bills or otherwise. I thought best to first send out a number of letters, informing the parties owing fees what my instructions were and give them an opportunity to pay without further costs, at the same time informing them that a fee bill would follow if the letter was not heeded. I have not had many fee bills issued, but expect to have a number issued between now and the next term of court. I have experienced considerable difficulty in locating a great many of the parties to the older fee bills, and getting their postoffice addresses. I expect to be able to report substantial progress at your next meeting. I think the costs in a number of cases will be paid without strong measures being used, as soon as the crops are harvested.

I have attached hereto a statement of my charges for services rendered during the past year, which I desire to have examined and if found correct, approved and paid.

Morrow presented the following resolution, which on motion of Corbin was referred to the special elections committee: WHEREAS, the general assembly of the state of Illinois amended section 305 of the election law of Illinois, so as to require an election booth for every seventy-five voters or fraction thereof, instead of one for every one hundred voters, and

WHEREAS, in strict compliance with that law this county will require thirty-five additional booths; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the committee on public property of this board be instructed to purchase enough booths for this county to comply with said law and have them delivered so as to be used at the next November election.

The communication from the Chicago, Wilmington and Vermilion Coal Co. to the sheriff being again laid before the board by the chairman, Thompson moved that said communication be laid on the table.

Motion lost. Moulton moved that said communication be referred to the committee on judiciary.

Motion carried. Sears moved that A. C. Norton be re-employed as attorney of the board for the ensuing year at a salary of \$50 per year.

Motion carried. Two petitions from James Brown, assessor of Newtown, for rebate of tax, were read and referred by the chairman to the committee on equalization.

A communication from the Children's Home Society, reciting the work done in this county by said society, was read and referred by the chairman to the committee on judiciary.

A petition from J. T. Kay for refunding of the sum paid by him at tax sale on erroneous description, was read and referred by the chairman to the committee on equalization.

A communication from Isaac R. Hitt, swamp land agent, was read and referred by the chairman to the committee on swamp lands.

Morrow, on behalf of the special building

committee, exhibited the plans of the new county house and explained the same.

The following report from the special building committee was read and on motion of Litchfield adopted:

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Livingston County, Illinois: Your special committee appointed for the purpose of constructing a new county house on the county farm, ask leave to report

That in order to inform ourselves as to the requirements and enable us to plan a building for convenience, comfort and health, we visited and made a thorough examination of the county houses of Will, Kane, La Salle, Kankakee and McLean counties. In all of said county houses we found faults, some of them quite serious faults. In one or two crowded houses we found inmates stowed away in damp basements with little or no ventilation. In no case did we find a building that suited us. But taking the good qualities of all into consideration and avoiding the bad qualities, we agreed on a plan, submitted the same to an architect, who made us a sketch satisfactory to all.

We then employed said architect to make plans and specifications, which, when done, were adopted by the committee. Advertisements for bids for its construction were sent out and we received the following bids to-wit: W. H. Hamilton, of Kankakee, \$85,250 00

The bid of W. H. Hamilton, \$85,250, being the lowest, was accepted and contract entered into with him to construct the building. Mr. Hamilton's contract is for a completion of the building entirely with the exception of the heating, which will have to be done by another contract later on or before winter sets in. We would further report that the old buildings have been removed in a southerly direction from where they stood, at a distance of about 200 feet.

Work on the new building has commenced but is being delayed by reason of the railroad strike.

Your committee to whom was referred the building of a bridge across the Vermilion river in Avoca township at what is known as the DeMoss ford, beg leave to submit the following report. Your committee, together with the commissioners of highways of Avoca township, met at the point where said bridge was proposed to be built, made the necessary examination as to the need of such bridge and decided in its favor, and as to how it should be constructed, advertised for bids, and at a subsequent meeting held in Fairbury, let the contract to the R. D. Wheaton Bridge Company for the sum of \$2,825, and on June 6, 1894, again met said commissioners at the bridge, made a thorough examination of the same and accepted it, made an order for the county's share of the same, to-wit, \$1,412.50, which order has been paid by the county treasurer. Said bridge is of iron and has tubes for piers and is 150 feet long divided into two spans of 75 feet each, and your committee is of the opinion that it is the best bridge in the county of which is respectfully submitted.
