National Convention.

The national convention Keeley League will be held in Colorado Springs in September, and already extensive preparations for a grand reception are being made by the members in that great silver state. From information we have at hand the convention will be the largest ever held. The eastern states will be largely represented, Pennsylvania already intimating they will send a delegation of twenty-five, and New York, Massachusetts and all the New England and eastern states will be represented. Kansas, Missouri and states and territories nearer the convention location will send large and enthusiastic delegations. The South will come up smiling and strong as usual.

It is quite likely that Illinois, the home of the great discoverer, Dr. Keeley, will be largely represented, and will send a carload at least. Every league in the state should send delegates if possible, and should hold meetings at an early date and elect delegates and report them to Secretary Willard S. Brown at state headquarters in Dwight, Illinois. This information should be furnished as quickly as possible, so that arrangements for transportation accommodations, etc. can be made accordingly, and information furnished the national secretary and the committees at Colorado Springs.

The state president wishes to earnestly request that this matter receive the early consideration of every league. Don't leave the matter until it is too late, the same as was done at the recent state convention and then expect preparations to be made. That is impossible. Notify state headquarters in time and all will be done to secure rates, etc., that can be. This should all be done prior to August 15.

We expect to report fifty, at least, from Illinois.

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Senatorial Convention.

The Senatorial Convention of the Twentieth District of Illinois, will be held at Venona on Tuesday, July 31, 1894, at 10 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of putting in nomination two candidates for the legislature to be voted for at the November election; also to elect a new senatorial committee of five members, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The counties in the district are Livingston, Woodford and Marshall, and each will be allowed one delegate for every 200 votes, or major fraction thereof cast for Harrison for president in 1892, which is as follows:
