GIVE WORK OR BREAD

CLAMOR OF HUNGRY ALIENS FOR BREAD

Big Fire Losses at Several Points—Floods in Mexico Drown Many—Silt in Lake Carrying Trade—Gov. Aligned Issues a Proclamation.

Told in a Few Words. Five thousand hungry and determined Poles and Bohemians gathered at the Rock Island crossing and Archer avenue, Chicago, Tuesday morning and demanded work. "Give us work or bread" was the slogan.

Fire broke out Tuesday morning in the four-story building at Memphis occupied by the Mansfield Drug Company. A quarter of a million dollars' worth of property was destroyed.

—Lerdo, Mexico, dispatch: The heavy rains in the mountains have caused one of the most damaging overflows of the Nassau River ever known.

—Vessel-men are trying hard to force an advance in grain freights. One lot of 40,000 bushels of wheat was on the Chicago market without takers at 1 1/2 cents for Buffalo.

Just before returning from Chicago to Springfield, Governor Altgeld issued a proclamation to the people of Illinois, asking them to send contributions to relieve the starving strikers at Pullman.

—Supreme Chancellor Blackwell, of the Knights of Pythias, has decided against recognizing the Pythian Sisters.

—The cases against the assailants of Adjutant General Tarsney, of Colorado, were dismissed, the Grand Jury having failed to find indictments.

—A house which was being torn down in Worcester, Mass., collapsed, burying a dozen children and three men. Seven were seriously injured.

—Vivian Burnett, the original of his mother's famous book, "Little Lord Fauntleroy," is lying critically ill with typhoid fever at the residence of his father, Dr. Burnett.

—The Nonpareil Printing and Publishing Company, at Council Bluffs, has been placed in the hands of a receiver.

—Walter Fisher, a developer at Dayton, Ohio, was shot and instantly killed by another developer, aged 15.

—A New York City fire, at the Van-dalia Road was drenched near Pocatohoe, N. J. Engine Thomas Manifee, Fireman Albert Dickinson, and four postal clerks were injured.

—A loss of 123,000 is reported through a conspiracy in which 2,000 acres of land owned by John P. Betz, the brewer of Philadelphia, Pa., were used to further the ends of two men who were in the penitentiary on a twenty years' sentence.

—The Kansas City Hay Press Company has sued H. F. Deval and his son for \$50,000 for alleged infringements of patents.

—George E. Reed, who murdered Daniel Heintzmann for \$50,000, was arraigned at Terre Haute, Ind., and is being held.

—Charles Beck, son of Edmund Beck, living near Valparaiso, Ind., was drowned in Lake Michigan.

WORK OF CONGRESS.

RESUME OF WHAT HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED.

Data Concerning a Remarkable Period of Legislation—Tariff, Silver Bills and Other Important Measures—Nearly 3,000 Nominations Sent to the Senate.

Tariff the Main Topic. It may be said that history has claimed the second session of the 44th Congress, one of the most remarkable periods of legislative activity since the foundation of the United States Government.

A little reflection will show that the assertion proposed to challenge this statement on the ground that it is too general, how true it is, when we consider the first time since March 4, '61, when Abraham Lincoln succeeded a Democratic President, the executive and legislative branches of the Government were in the hands of the Democratic party, pledged to change the prevailing method of raising revenue. Added to this the country was confronted by an appalling prospect of financial disaster.

Remarkable as were the radical changes proposed they were made even more so by the character of the measures which were enacted. In four years in the White House from 1855 to 1859 showed conclusively that party pressure did not succeed in making him change a policy he had outlined. With this knowledge Mr. Cleveland, when he took the oath of office, declared that he would not be swayed by party pressure.

Only One Longer Session. The second session of the Fifty-third Congress, including the first, or extraordinary session, lasted over 350 days, a record exceeded only by the first Congress, which held a session of 431 days.

House and Senate Calendars. About 800 of 1,500 bills acted upon were passed by the House and sent to the Senate, but owing to the extended debate on the tariff bill in the latter body only 100 or 150 bills reached the Senate.

NATION'S NEW TARIFF. During this session of Congress there were sent to the Senate by the President 2,461 messages, containing nominations. Inasmuch as some of these messages contained more than one nomination, notably in the case of military and naval promotions, a fair estimate of the total number of nominations sent to the Senate is about 3,000.

Rates of Duties Upon a Number of Great Commercial Staples. The new tariff law places the following rates of duty upon the great staples which have been the bones of contention:

Raw sugars, 40 per cent ad valorem; refined sugars, 16 per cent ad valorem; molasses, 10 per cent ad valorem; refined molasses, 10 per cent ad valorem; refined molasses, 10 per cent ad valorem.

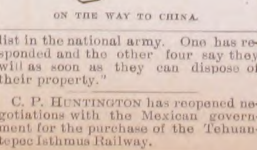
