The Races.

The first day of the races, under the auspices of the Dwight Driving Park Association, passed off very pleasantly and successfully.

The first race was for home horses, and was a pretty good one all around. The entries were: Gasoline, by Harry Seelcy; Milo, by A. B. Conant; Queen B, by Mr. Smiley, and Bill Nye, by Mr. Wales. They won in the order named, Gasoline winning first in three straights in 3:21, 3:24 and 3:20.

The second race was a free-for-all pony, best two in three. The entries were, Little Cliff, owned by Umpenour, of Pontiac; Chris, by Tom Real Jr.; Polly, by Conkin; Well Used, by Ed Logan, of Bloomington, and Little Joe. Well Used proved a surprise, and after the first heat there was a great war about his not being a pony, but he was branded. Well Used won the first two heats very easily, Polly (the favorite) second; Chris, fourth, and Little Cliff trailing.

The 2:40 trot was very easily won by Bob Kane's pretty little Topsy in 2:40 and 2:37. She shut out Grant and Com mandant on the second heat and ended the race, getting first money, and the association got second and third. Topsy is one of the handsomest animals in the country, and Kane thinks a great deal of her.

THURSDAY.

The second day of the races was a pleasant one, both as to the weather and the quality of the races. The crowd was larger than the first day and all seemed to enjoy themselves.

The first race, free-for-all running, had five entries, as follows: Well Used, Rapidan, Lady Mack, Bud H., Rodney, and they came in the last two heats, in the order named. Well Used had to be teased to come in at all, and then walked away with first. The time was 53.

The second race was a 2:50 trot, with three entries, and they won as follows: Nellie, owned by Baker Bros., of Kan- kakee, in 2:38, 2:38, and 2:43. Topsy was second with Hattie Martin trailing.

The last race was a two in three pony race with three entries. The first heat was won by Polly in 54. The second by Little Joe in 56. Gray Harry was not in it. There was lots of money changed hands on this race.

There will be races at Saunemin today and at Mazon next Saturday.
