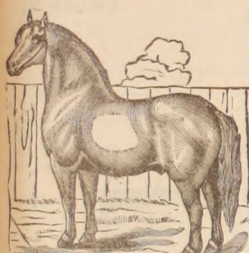

Corner Stone.
The ceremonies connected with the laying of the corner stone of the county poor house took place at the farm south-east of Pontiac, Tuesday. The farm is a fine one and the location of the new building is very fine. The chairman of the building committee, Jas. Morrow, of Pontiac, and the committee had charge of arrangements, and they were complete. There were from 1,000 to 1,500 present, and all appeared to enjoy themselves.

James Morrow was chairman and master of ceremonies, and a right good one he made. The crowd was called to order about 2 o'clock and Rev. Father Lyons offered a prayer.
The principal address of the day was made by Hon. George W. Patton, of Pontiac, and remarks were made by Revs. Hussey and Campell, Lawyer Harding, and the superintendent of the McLean county poor farm. The addresses were all excellent, Mr. Patton's being highly spoken of by all.

The committee had seen to it that a great spread of good things was prepared to eat, and everyone took advantage of circumstances and filled themselves to their heart's content.

The new building proper will be a very fine one and cost about \$40,000. In addition to that a heating building will be erected a little ways away, costing about \$10,000. The large building will be heated by hot air generated from the small building, and everything will be comfortable and homelike, and the unfortunate poor of Livingston county will be right in it, much to the credit of all concerned.

Congressional Convention.
