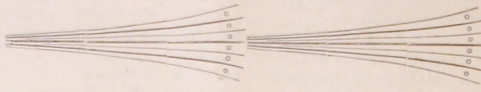

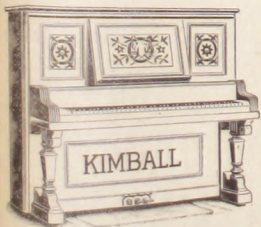

A HOME WEDDING.

Marriage of Miss Jean Cantner to W. S. Arnold, of Dwight.

The pleasant home of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Cantner on South Charter street, was the scene, Wednesday evening, of one of the prettiest weddings of the season, the contracting parties being Miss Jean, their youngest daughter, and Judge William S. Arnold, of Dwight, Ill. The ceremony was performed in the parlors, which were tastefully decorated for the occasion, by Rev. J. F. Wohlfarth, of the M. E. church. At the appointed hour, the wedding march, which was played by Miss Crea, announced the approach of the couple soon to be united, they taking their appointed places and the simple and impressive "ring" ceremony was soon over. The bride was attired simply in pure white and wore no ornaments.

After the ceremony there were the usual congratulations and the customary wedding supper, with music and conversation afterward. The company did not break up till shortly after midnight, when Judge Arnold and his charming bride left for a short lake trip, before settling down to the routine of domestic felicity at their home in Dwight. Judge Arnold is a man with a history. A native of Wisconsin, he removed to the Dakotas early in the 70's and is one of the pioneers who brought order out of chaos in the then turbulent country. He was the first district attorney of the 2d Judicial district of the territory, and afterwards assistant district attorney, in which position he conducted the prosecution and conviction of McCall, the murderer of "Wild Bill." He was judge of surrogate, and was a member of the first constitutional convention of the state. In 1887, he removed to Los Angeles, where he practiced law until his appointment to his present important position of Chief Attorney for the Keeley Institutes. He is a splendid man and is well worthy of the beautiful, amiable and accomplished young bride he has secured.—Monticello Bulletin.
