Death of Mr. McCarthy.
 Mr. J. D. McCarthy met with an accident last week Thursday that resulted in his death. He was hauling apples for Mr. Whitlock, and while unloading at the residence his team started forward, pitching and causing a barrel, in some manner, to fall upon him, striking him across the abdomen. While lying on the ground the wagon, containing five barrels of apples, ran over him. He was taken home and a physician sent for. It was discovered that he was very badly injured internally from which he suffered greatly. He gradually grew worse until death ensued Saturday.
 Mr. McCarthy had been a resident of Dwight about three years, having come here from Odell at that time. He was in the teaming business. He leaves a wife and daughter to mourn his untimely end, and the people of Dwight and Odell extend their sympathy.
 The funeral was held Sunday at the house and the remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Odell, quite a large number of the friends here accompanying the funeral party.
 Dr. Bergman informs us that Mr. McCarthy had a rupture and the wheel of the wagon passed over him so as to injure that part and death was caused from peritonitis.
Funeral of Thomas Comford.
 The funeral of the unfortunate victim of the railroad crossing accident, Thursday night of last week, Mr. Thomas Comford, was held Saturday at 10 a. m., and was largely attended. The G. A. R., of which the deceased was an enthusiastic member, the W. R. C. and the S. of V. met at the former's hall, and with draped flags marched to the home and accompanied the funeral party to the Catholic church. Seats were reserved for the mourners and societies. Rev. Father Moore conducted the funeral ceremonies and preached a short, comforting sermon. After which the Grand Army took charge of the remains, and the mournful procession proceeded to the Catholic cemetery. At the grave the beautiful G. A. R. burial ceremony was gone through, Commander Ayling officiating.
