HOLDS THE NATION'S PURSE.

The Unique Powers of the First Comptroller of the Treasury.

Many people have an idea that when Congress passes a bill and the President signs it, or allows it to become a law by limitation, that that's the end of it. It isn't. If the law carries an appropriation it can be nullified by the action of the first comptroller of the treasury. He can tie the strings of the public purse and all the power of the nation cannot force him to untie them. His ruling is absolute and the United States Supreme Court, which is higher than the power which created it, has decided that no moneys can be paid on any draft or warrant without his approval.

If Congress sees fit to increase the payroll of its members the first comptroller of the treasury may decide that these statesmen are paid enough for their idle vapourings and may refuse to pay the increase. A case in point has just occurred and illustrates the power of the first comptroller, who, by the way, is Robert B. Bowler, of Ohio.

It is one of the privileges of government officials that when they need anything pertaining to their office they simply send out and get it. A short time ago Hon. Hoke Smith, who is supplied with a government horse and carriage, needed a new set of harness. He got one costing \$500. Mr. Bowler thought that a less costly set would do to haul around the dignity of the Secretary of the Interior and he refused to foot the bill. Hon. Hoke Smith will thus have to pay from his own purse the difference between the sum that Mr. Bowler deems reasonable and the \$500. Another instance where the comptroller asserted his power was in relation to an act of Congress increasing the pay of the members of the Marine Band. The comptroller believed they were paid on enough and refused to give any increase.

An important personage, indeed, is Robert B. Bowler, of Ohio.

He Was a Hero.

It isn't often that one finds among the mountaineers of the Southwest a hero of the highest type, but they do exist, and a year or so ago I met one said a traveler. I had been in his neighborhood for three months, and I knew that he had killed a man or two and had the reputation of being the gamest man in the mountains. He was extremely handy with a gun too and everybody gave him a wide berth whenever there was a prospect of a row. One day, however, he got into a difficulty with a man from an adjoining county, and when the shooting began he cut and run like a white-head leaving the field in possession of the other party. Two days after we met him on the road. "I was a bit surprised at the way you acted," I said as mildly as I could, for even then I had no wish to stir him up.

"I reckon most folks wuz," he replied b. left.

"I know they were, and they d n't understand it. Neither do I."

"Well," he said, half apologetically, "I reckons I jist run and that wuz all thar wuz to hit."

"There was more than that; you lost your reputation by it."

"Mebbe I did, Colonel," and he swallowed a lump in his throat; "but that thar fellow had seven little children dependin' on him, an' I kinder had a idea jist afore I pulled trigger that mebbe I could git along better without my reputation than they could without thar daddy, so I run."

He stopped, as if uncertain what to say next, and I took him by the hand and shook it with a vigor that I knew he appreciated by the look that came into his eyes.

Large Landholders.

Mr. Vanderbilt owns 2,000,000 acres of land in the United States. Mr. Diston, of Pennsylvania, boasts of his 4,000,000 broad acres. The Schuylley estate owns 2,000 acres within the cities of Pittsburg and Allegheny. The California millionaire, Murphy, owns an area of land bigger than the whole State of Massachusetts. Foreign noblemen, who owe no allegiance to this country, are permanent absentee landlords and spend all their money abroad, own 21,000,000 acres of land in this country, or more than the entire area of Ireland. Lord Scilly, of Ire land owns 90,000 acres of farming land in Illinois, which he rents out in small parcels to tenant farmers, and pockets his annual \$200,000 in rents to spend abroad.

Charities in London.

The income of merely the principal charitable institutions having their headquarters in London amounts to over £7,000,000 per annum, or \$35,000,000. That represents a sum equal to half the whole capital invested in the Bank of England. It exceeds the total annual revenues of all the British colonies together in 1884, and it is as much as the present total annual revenues of all the British colonies, excluding New South Wales, Victoria and Canada. It is added to this sum the income of the smaller charities the total benevolence paid voluntarily in the metropolis does not fall far short of £10,000,000 sterling, or \$50,000,000.

Electricity in Alaska.

A system of electric lighting is being put in at Juneau, one of the best known of the Alaska settlements—a place of 2,000 inhabitants. When completed this will be the first electric-light plant in the Territory. Electricity, however, has been used for some time in a limited way in the Alaska mines. Water power is abundant everywhere, and the current is generated on the streams and carried to the mines by cables.

Unsound Teeth Barred.

The regulations of the British post-office require that every unsound tooth shall be taken out of a man's head before he can be employed. An unfortunate girl who was recently examined for promotion had fourteen teeth taken out at one sitting by order of the official dentist, who explained that "we can't have girls laid up with tooth-ache."

A Wedding Centennial.

One of the most remarkable wedding anniversary celebrations which the world has ever seen was recently held in Hungary, being the centenary of the marriage of the Countess and her wife. This illustrious couple, who by the laws of the country must have been at least 20 and 15 years old respectively at the time were married in 1764, as is officially attested by church records and otherwise.
