

AROUND THE EARTH OCCURRENCES THEREIN FOR A WEEK.

FLAMES PREY ON LIFE SEVEN HELPLESS VICTIMS IN NEW YORK.

Stairway Burned Away, and No Efforts Could Avail to Aid—Embargo on Beef Extended to All German Ports—Bloody Georgia Battle.

A broad sheet of flame flashed with marvelous rapidity from the cellar to the roof of a five-story apartment building in New York, at a o'clock Tuesday morning, and under the inky pall of smoke that succeeded the firemen's efforts to extinguish it seven persons were burned and suffocated to death.

The prohibition against the landing of American cattle and American dressed meat, announced by a decree of the Hamburg senate on Saturday last, was extended Tuesday to every port in Germany.

At New Orleans the carriage factory of J. Thompson & Bros. was burned. Loss, \$25,000; insurance, \$20,000. Fire destroyed the Bushong Hotel and the store of Gould & Dowd at Emporia, Kan.

The Rome Reforma has advice from Kassala stating that the mahdi had proclaimed a holy war against Italians. The Governor of Massowah has ordered the fifth battalion of Italian troops at Kassala with number 7,000 and the mahdi's army 12,000.

Tuesday morning an unknown man broke into Fred Skinner's house, about three miles from Columbiaville, Mich., and murdered Mr. and Mrs. Skinner and the father's mother-in-law, Sunday. The murderer has so far eluded capture.

Ex-Premier Mercier died at Montreal, Que. Tuesday morning. He was 83 years of age and had been blind for some years. He was born in 1840 in the village of Itherville.

The Italian bark Scuto, Captain Sapia, from Philadelphia, on Sept. 21 for Spain, was boarded by pirates off Horno Nuevo, Africa, who plundered the vessel and escaped with 1,000 boxes of petroleum.

Mrs. W. G. Hamilton, keeper of a lodging house in Arkansas City, Kan., shot and instantly killed Charles Stooling, a baker, who came from her establishment. She says Stooling choked and threatened to kill her.

The long-expected and much-discussed meeting of the stockholders of the Grand Trunk Railroad of Canada took place at Toronto. A large number of angry stockholders were present by proxy.

Capt. O. H. P. Brandon died at Noblesville, Ind.

The Marquis of Londow has been created a Knight of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Treasurer Barney, of DeWitt County, Ohio, is short \$12,000 in his accounts.

San Ildefonso, alias Downing, has again been sentenced to be hanged at Fort Smith, Ark., for the murder of United States Deputy John Wilson, of Muskogee, in September, 1891.

Henry Frederick Schatzel, a Brooklyn baker, is about to bring suit for property in Texas amounting to nearly two hundred and seventy square miles and worth \$2,000,000.

Trouble has again broken out at New Orleans between the white and negro women, and further bloodshed is feared.

A battery has purchased the Harborm interest and now the sole owner of the Harborm circuit.

TALMAGE'S SERMON. FROM THE FAR EAST A MESSAGE OF GRACE IS SENT.

Man Beholdeth His Natural Face in a Glass, but God Has Provided One Which Reveals the Man at Heart, and with It an Infinite Release.

Rev. Dr. Talmage, who has left India and is now on his homeward journey, selected as the subject of his sermon this week through the press, "The Looking Glass," his text being Exodus xxxviii, 8.

We often hear about the gospel in John, and the gospel in Luke, and the gospel in Matthew, but there is just as much in the gospel of a prophet as in the gospel of a king.

When the Israelites were marching through the wilderness, they carried their church with them. They called it the tabernacle. It was a pitched tent, very costly, very beautiful. The framework was made of forty-eight boards of acacia wood set in sockets of silver.

I wish now more especially to speak of the laver that was built in the midst of that ancient tabernacle. It was a great basin from which the priests washed their hands and feet.

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I have to say that this is the only looking glass in which a man can see himself as he is. There are some mirrors that flatter the features and make you look better than you are.

When I was on the sea, and there came up a great storm, and officers and crew and passengers all thought we must go down, I began to think of my life insurance and whether if I were killed, there would be any money provided for me.

Notice also, in regard to this laver of looking glasses spoken of in the text, that the priests always washed both hands and feet. The water came down in spouts, so that, without leaving any water on the floor, the priests washed both hands and feet.

Here, for instance, is ingratitude. Who has been guilty of that sin? It is the man who has been baptized, and says, "Thank you," but for 10,000 mercies that we are every day receiving from the hand of God how little expression of gratitude—for hunger fed, for shelter and sunshine and sound sleep and clothes to wear, how little thanks!

It is a very good man except in nothing that he is not a good man. A religion that will not take a man through an autumn election will not be worth anything in his June, July, and August. They say he is a useful sort of a man, but he overreaches in a way who has not felt it; he is not a Christian anywhere, he will be in his business. It is very easy to be good in the prayer meeting, with surroundings kindly and blessed, but not so easy when you are in the Christian behind the counter.

When the priests came into the tabernacle (you will find this in the thirtieth chapter of Exodus), God tells them that they must wash in it before they enter.

What was the use of that, you say? "But," says the priest, "there is water just as clean as this. Why won't that do?" "Wash here," says God, "or die." So it is with the gospel of Christ. It is imperative. There is only this alternative—keep clean and perish, or wash them away and live.
