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Arbitration in New Zealand.
One result of the recent democratic victory in New Zealand will be the passage of a compulsory arbitration law within six months, and it will not be long before this example is followed by the Australian colonies. This law, which, in the opinion of Mr. Reeves, will work satisfactorily and do a vast amount of good, will provide that any association of registered workmen may file a complaint against an employer and compel him to show cause in court why wages should be reduced or why they should not be raised. Employers, on the other hand, will get the right to compel the association of employees to appear in court in case of a strike. When either party brings the other into court both parties are to be bound by the court's decision. The act will apply only to registered laborers and incorporated associations and protect employers against actions brought by laborers not connected with any organization.—Washington Post.

Names of Chinese Warships.
To the Chinese there is no confusion in the names of their cruisers and gunboats, and if Ting Yuen and King Yuen get mixed by the time they arrive in New York it will not seriously affect the fortunes of war in the China Sea. In colloquial Chinese the distinction is preserved by the difference of tone. In the Chinese characters, or ideographs, the possibility of confusion is absolutely nil, for Chih Yuen and Chih Yuen no more resemble each other than do "New York" and "Minneapolis," or than Bunker Hill monument resembles the State House. "Ting Yuen" signifies "future security," "Chen Yuen," "guarding the future." The characters on the other vessels are as distinct in sound, appearance, and meaning as these two.—Boston Transcript.

A Curious Georgia Monster.

"It's so, though. They're so feared o' repeatin' themselves that they don't think o' makin' the same kind o' speeches in Congress that they make on the stump."

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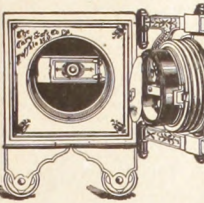
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
