Renfrew Again. The village board met Tuesday evening and a communication was received from W. H. Ketcham regarding the sewer tax on Renfrew park having been paid by the village, and that the park was not assessed for general taxation to any person, on account of being a public park, and the fact that the village records showed the park to have been donated to the city Sept. 1, 1891, and renewing his (W. H. Ketcham's) offer to straighten out the matter of deed one way or another, so that future assessments and taxes may be assessed rightly and the village get its just dues.

The board received the communication, and on motion the original proposition of Mr. Ketcham, as previously published, was accepted by the board, he being required to give \$3000 bond to do his duty or accomplish something.

Those voting in the affirmative were Geo. Baker, Eugene Flagler, R. H. Mills, Sam McLane. Voting against, Naffziger. Absent, Stevens.

We expect that the park will soon be re-presented to the town board on a silver seryer.

Thanksgiving Shoot. The \$300 shoot so much talked of was given up Thursday on account of inability to get 300 birds to shoot at. This was a slight disappointment but the shooters and their friends enjoyed a pleasant afternoon anyway. There were six shoots during the afternoon, the last being a \$50 match between Ame Orr and Mr. Atkinson.

Those who took part in the other shoots were as follows: Thos. Jenkins, D. Riling, M. Diefenbaugh, Geo. Tate, Jas. Ketcham, Wm. Wykes, C. V. Bower, M. Rinehart, Fred Steffin, R. Orr, Theo. Hays, H. F. Adams and Ed. Dittus.

The first five shoots were at ten birds each. The first was a tie between M. Rinehart and H. F. Adams, each getting eight out of ten.

The second was won by Adams, getting nine of ten.

The third was a tie between Diefenbaugh and Steffin, eight each.

The fourth a tie between Riling and Bower, eight each.

The fifth, tie between Bower and Steffin, nine each.

Then came the match of the day, at 50 live birds each. There was lots of excitement during this match, but it proved to be a walk-away for Ame Orr, he killing 43 birds, which was a splendid record for such a bad day.

Atkinson retired at the thirty-eighth shot, having been beaten.

There was a large crowd present and lots of fun. The gun club is a grand success.
