**A Fatal Accident.**

This morning about 10 o'clock an accident occurred on the switch leading to the Acme Coal company's shaft which resulted in the death of Charles F. Phaler, a C. & A. brakeman. An engine was pushing a car in on the switch to the shaft, and Phaler and Conductor Goodman were riding on the head end of the car. In going around a curve the car jumped the track, throwing the two men to the ground. Goodman fell outside the track, but Phaler fell in front of the car and on the track. When Goodman got up and looked around he saw Phaler dragging himself from under the car, the engineer, J. W. Simmons, having stopped the engine almost immediately, the speed only being about four miles an hour. Grod man went to Phaler and raised him up and saw at once that he was fatally injured. Phaler lived but a few minutes after the accident occurred.

Deputy Coroner Painter was notified, and an inquest is being held. No reason can be given for the car jumping the track. The train has been doing work there nearly every day for months past, and this is the first time an accident has happened.

Mr. Phaler was a young man about 24 years of age, and a resident of Bloomington. He is the second one of the family to be killed by the cars in the past year. A special train was sent over from Dwight to convey the remains to Bloomington.—Streator Free Press, Nov. 24.
